- Status Report on Y.U.S.A.'s Application: Last Friday the expected Report was received from the Ontario Labour Relations Board and the University and Y.U.S.A. now have the opportunity to review its contents prior to a formal Hearing the Ontario Labour Relations Board will convene in the near future. The Report states that of the 180 positions the Examiner was instructed to study the University and Y.U.S.A. have now agreed to include 35 in the bargaining unit, to exclude another 70, and thus leave 75 in dispute. The Report draws no conclusions nor makes any recommendations about these outstanding positions, but includes the word-for-word testimony of 29 persons interviewed who are representative of these 75 positions. At that Hearing each party will utilize the recorded information to support their position as to the conclusions the Ontario Labour Relations Board should reach in determining which of these 75 positions should be included/excluded from the group Y.U.S.A. seeks to represent. next significant point in this process of reaching a decision over whether or not Y.U.S.A. will be certified will be the determination by the Board of the level of Y.U.S.A. membership as of December 30, 1974. The Board will count Y.U.S.A.'s membership cards filed as of that date and then either issue a certificate without any further proceedings or conduct a vote among all current staff in the bargaining unit with a simple majority of those actually voting determining the issue. The Board's decision on (a) what the bargaining unit will be and (b) whether or not there will be a vote, will probably be made toward the end of October or early November. Proposed Salary Increases for Staff (Y.U.S.A.)

Earlier this year the University and the York University Staff Association had not been able to reach an agreement on salary increases to become effective July 1st, 1975. It was necessary to reach this consent before implementing salary increases in order to satisfy requirements of the Labour Relations Act that governs situations when a union is seeking certification enabling it to bargain collectively on behalf of a group of employees.

As any formal arrangement between the University and Y.U.S.A. would still appear to be some time away, the University approached the Y.U.S.A. executive last week, asking them to re-consider their earlier decision.

The University has advised the Y.U.S.A. executive that it wishes to increase the annual salary rate of each individual covered by Y.U.S.A.'s application by \$1000 per annum or by 10.5%, whichever amount is the greater. This change would be effective July 1st- 1975, and would apply to all full-time staff on the payroll as of the date of Y.U.S.A.'s written agreement with these arrangements.

A membership meeting was held last Friday and another is being held today. Assuming the University receives this acceptance, all changes, including back pay, can be included in the October salary.
