### NOTICE OF PLANNED SHUT DOWN OF UTILITIES - YORK CAMPUS

There will be a shut down in the Steam Line from 7.00 p.m. to 9.00 p.m. this Wednesday evening. Buildings affected are Winters College and McLaughlin College. Due to the short duration of the shut down, no significant change in building temperature is anticipated, however, building domestic hot water will be affected. The purpose of the shut down is to permit essential maintenance to be carried out on the high pressure steam line, in the services distribution tunnel.
