GENERAL

According to long-term enrolment estimates issued by Ontario's Department of University Affairs, York University will rank second among all Ontario universities in terms of total full-time undergraduate enrolment by 1970. The figures, based on enrolment estimates submitted by the 14 provincially assisted universities themselves, show that in the 1970-71 academic year, University of Toronto (including Scarborough and Erindale), will have a total full-time undergraduate enrolment of 19,190, followed by York (8,900), Western (8,510) and Waterloo (7,342).

Canadian composer and musician William McCauley is taking a year's leave of absence from York University (where he is Director of Music, a Fellow of McLaughlin College, and an Honorary Member of the Alumni Association) to work with film-maker Christopher Chapman on the music for an Ontario Government film to be shown at Expo '70 in Japan. The film, placing heavier emphasis on human and cultural resources of the Province than did Chapman's successful "A Place to Stand", shown at Expo '67, and will rely on music as an essential part of the multi-screen production.

A number of representatives from Faculty, Student Councils and Administration met on Wednesday to discuss tentative ideas and planning for the celebration of York's tenth anniversary next spring.
