The second, to be shown on Thursday, May 15, is an analysis of the elements of the cathedral by John Canaday, art critic of the New York Times. Both films will be shown in room 009F, Steacie Science Library at 12:30 p.m.

GENERAL

- The appointment of Harry S. Crowe as Dean of the Joseph E. Atkinson College, effective July 1st, has been announced by York University President, Murray G. Ross. Professor Crowe succeeds D. McCormack Smyth who has been Dean of the College since 1964. Dean Smyth has announced his intention to take a sabbatical and then return to teaching when his Deanship expires on June 30th.
- The Faculty of Fine Arts will be host to secondary school teachers in Metro Toronto and environs on three successive evenings, (May 20, art; May 21, theatre; and May 22, film) in Stedman Lecture Halls. The purpose is to exchange ideas with High School Teachers on curriculum and admissions.

The series at York will consist of the highlights of the Taiwan series. No knowledge of tensor analysis is assumed. The lectures will all start at 1:30 p.m. on: Tuesday, May 20; Wednesday, May 21; Friday, May 23; Monday, May 26; Wednesday, May 28; and Friday, May 30. These will all be held in the Seminar Room, Room 217, Petrie Building.
