
GENERAL

- The film "Douglas Point" (30 mins.Colour) will be shown on August 6 at 12:30 p.m. in Room Ol2A, Steacie Science Library. This film, sponsored by Steacie Science Library, examines the construction of Canada's first commercial size nuclear power station.
- Construction has been started on a building (located on the service road off Keele Street, east of the Physical Plant Workshops), to house the Kinsmen National Institute on Mental Retardation and Human Development. This is the first of the allied institutes York University plans for its York Campus. The building is being funded by the Kinsmen Clubs, for the Canadian Association for Retarded Children, the property being leased by the University on a long term basis. Cross-appointments between York's Department of Psychology and Institute will be announced shortly. Members of the Psychology Department will be able to use the facilities for approved research in this area. The building itself will be a two-storey structure of approximately 25,000 gross square feet.
- The Library is replacing the present Xerox 914 coin-operated copier with two Savin 222 coin-operated copiers. Two of these will be in the Steacie Science Library, and one in the Leslie Frost Library. The charge will be 5¢ per copy instead of the 10¢ used by the Xerox.
