

Produced by the Information Department, the cost of the Bulletin will depend directly on how many editions are required, but will be limited to actual printing and distribution costs, and kept at an absolute minimum. Part of this cost will be absorbed by savings in existing publications and announcements that will no longer be required.

A further report concerning the Special Bulletin will be made shortly and will include information as to how members of the community may make use of the service.







A MESSAGE FROM THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

York University received from the Committee of Presidents the working paper entitled Order on the Campus on the 22nd of September. The document was dated the 18th of September. and was mailed simultaneously to the Executive Vice-Chairman of the Ontario Council of University Faculty Associations and to the press. It has been published and is now a public document. I attended the meeting of Presidents at which the working paper was drafted. I agreed to its circulation on the clear understanding that the statement did not propose to speak for any university, was not binding on any university. It was to be circulated only for purposes of discussion.

The situation at York University is different from the situation in other universities of Ontario. The Laskin Committee which was struck in January 1968 has now completed its hearings and is formulating its report. All representations to the committee have now been made and received. It hopes to report next month and the recommendations of the committee will be thoroughly discussed before we arrive at a final document.

In our academic community we are trying to cope in our own way with the question of order on the campus. We are going about our own business and we are not going to be distracted or put off course by anything that may be happening in other universities, or elsewhere. What we want and what we shall have is a document of our own.


