

* The following is a message from the Premier of Ontario:

In a letter to the presidents of twenty provincially-supported universities and other post-secondary educational institutions, Ontario's Premier John P. Robarts outlines the problems facing the government in its effort to provide adequate financial support in the face of rapidly growing demands, and rising costs. Referring to the recent agreement between the provincial and federal government to adopt a policy of voluntary restraint to fight inflation, Mr. Robarts concludes his letter by saying; "... I would like to emphasise to you as strongly as possible the importance of conveying to all members of your university community the Government's determination to make this voluntary approach effective, if at all possible, in the hope that more stringent measures will not be necessary."

In order to make the best possible use of dining facilities in the #1 College Complex the following changes will be required: Starting Sunday through Wednesday, May 10 -13, the Founders/Vanier Servery will be closed. McLaughlin Dining Hall will be used for general dining and Winters Dining Hall for Conference guests. As of breakfast Thursday, May 14, normal dining will resume in the Founders/Vanier Dining Halls.

GENERAL

* In the light of current labour problems in the Canada Post Office there is a strong possibility that there will be a stoppage in Mail Services on or after Tuesday, May 19th, 1970.

Should this occur, arrangements have been made for alternative means of collection and delivery of Urgent 1st Class Mail to points outside Canada, to all Ontario Universities with the exception of Lakehead and Laurentian, and to Provincial Government Offices in Toronto, and Federal Government Offices in Toronto and Ottawa.

The Library and the Department of International Affairs have agreed to allow Departments the use of their Telex Machines provided that such requests are accompanied by Works Requests.

Should the strike materialize, a memorandum will be sent to all Departments advising them of this and the specific procedures to be followed.

In view of the limited funds available for the provision and maintenance of parking facilities the Presidential Advisory Committee on Parking has recommended that access to the inner areas of the campus should be by St. Lawrence and Ottawa Boulevards only. Access to all peripheral lots will still be available from Keele Street and Steeles Avenue, but it will not be possible to enter Fraser Drive via Niagara Boulevard ('J' Lot), Thompson Boulevard ('D' Lot) or York Road. Gatehouses at these locations will not be manned, thus effecting a substantial saving in operating expenses. It is anticipated that the above action will also reduce the congestion in reserved parking lots and in other restricted areas.

The Director of Safety and Security Services advises all members of the University community that the above recommendation will be implemented effective May 25th, 1970. In addition, after 6:00 p.m. on weekdays, and on weekends and holidays, Ottawa Boulevard will be closed, and all entry will be by St. Lawrence Boulevard.







* In view of the limited funds available for the provision and maintenance of parking facilities, the Presidential Advisory Committee on Parking has recommended that access to the inner areas of the campus should be by St. Lawrence and Ottawa Blvds. only. Access to all peripheral lots will still be available from Keele Street and Steeles Avenue, but it will not be possible to enter Fraser Drive via Niagara Blvd. ('J' Lot), Thompson Blvd. ('D' Lot) or York Road. Gatehouses at these locations will not be manned, thus effecting a substantial saving in operating expenses. It is anticipated that the above action will also reduce the congestion in reserved parking lots and in other restricted areas.

The Director of Safety and Security Services advises all members of the University community that the above recommendation will be implemented effective May 25, 1970. In addition, after 6:00 p.m. on weekdays, and on weekends and holidays, Ottawa Blvd. will be closed, and all entry will be by St. Lawrence Blvd.


