The elevator equipment in the Ross Building now provides <u>automatic control</u>. for operation of elevators in case of power failure. Operation is limited to one elevator in service <u>after</u> each elevator in turn is run down to the main floor and shut off, with doors open. The north elevator in the south tower will normally be left in service.

1970/71 Parking Permits are now available in the Parking Office, Temporary Office Building. Application forms may also be obtained at the Main Gatehouse. Faculty and Staff are requested to submit applications as soon as possible. Fees for 1970/71 are as follows: Annual Reserved Permit, \$75; Annual Unreserved Permit, \$15; Sessional Permit (Atkinson students only), \$3 per course; motor cycles, \$2; and registration is free, allowing parking in designated peripheral lot only, on payment of daily fee.

Fees may be paid in cash at the Accounting Office, T.O.B., or arrangements made for the appropriate payroll deduction. Permits will not be issued to applicants having outstanding parking violations.

Holders of Annual Reserved Permits are asked to note that the 1970/71 regulations provide that such permits entitle holders to park in a specifically designated lot on a first come, first served basis, rather than in a particular space in the lot as at present, and numbers will be removed from the lots forthwith. 1969/70 permits are no longer valid.


