The Honourable Chief Justice of Manitoba, Samuel Freedman, and Dr. Roger J. Rossiter, Vice-President Academic, and Provost, University of Western Ontario, will receive the honorary Doctor of Laws degree. Chief Justice Freedman will deliver the Convocation Address.

Occupants of these buildings may regulate their cooling by means of the fan speed switch to be found on each fan unit. Occupants should take note that there is no automatic changeover from cooling back to heating, therefore, it is recommended that the fans be shut off over night whenever cool weather prevails. This will prevent rooms being too cool the following morning. A similar switchover to cooling will take place in other buildings in which booster fan coil units have been installed in offices, classrooms, and corridors. Where individual occupant control is provided, the same precaution regarding overnight shutdown during cooler weather applies.
