The evergreen Christmas Tree, safe with intelligent use, can present a serious fire hazard if improperly handled. The following are a few simple steps to safe enjoyment of your tree:

- 1. When picking out a tree, select one with fresh firm needles.
- 2. Saw of butt at an angle one inch above original cut.
- 3. Stand in water and top up regularly.
- 4. Support firmly, do not place it near any source of heat such as fireplaces, radiators.
- 5. Locate where it will not topple over and block an exit route.
- 6. Do not smoke near tree.
- 7. Use of fire-retardant chemical spray on your tree is no substitute for butt immersion and is not recommended.
- 8. No open flame devices such as candles should be used on or near the tree.
- 9. Use only flame-proof paper based decorations. Where possible use angel hair, metal or non-combustible decorations.
- 10. Place all excess wrappings, etc. into a waste material container for proper disposal.
- 11. Before using lighting sets check for wear and test before installing. All sets should bear the C.S.A. or U.L.C. label of approval.
- 12. Metal trees should have indirect illumination only. Do not install lights on or in contact with tree as it could become electrically energized.
- 13. To complete your Christmas Fire Safety Program, make arrangements for an inspection of your tree and decorations by contacting Mr. Bob Richards, Safety Office, local 3351.
