## GENERAL

- \* The Government of India has announced the offer of three visiting awards annually, for prominent educationists (professor, senior headmasters and educational administrators, etc.) from the Commonwealth countries, to undertake a study and observation tour in India in the educational field of their choice. The awards are not earmarked for any particular country but will be open to educationists from all Commonwealth countries. These awards cover the cost of international air travel in tourist or economy class; the cost of travel within India by air, rail or road; an allowance of Rs. 75.00 (\$11.25) to Rs. 100.00 (\$15.00) per day, depending on the status of the award-holder; and the medical and hospital charges, if any. Each award will be of not more than three months' duration depending upon the needs expressed. The best period of the year for the visits to India would be from September to December, so as to avoid the interruption in the academic sessions of India educational institutions due to the long vacations. The Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada (A.U.C.C.) would welcome the nomination of Canadian educationists who would be best suited to visit India under this Scheme. In this connection, the suggested names should be accompanied by their curricula vitae, and contain the following information: address in Canada; age; nationality; whether married or single; present position held; academic and other distinctions held; and nature and program of the study in India, indicating specifically the particular field of study desired. Nomination should be forwarded directly to the Director of Awards, 151 Slater Street, Ottawa, Ontario K1P 5N1, no later than April 15, 1972.
- \* The Department of Physical Plant wishes to forewarn the Community of an embargo on telephone orders by Bell Canada effective April 14th, 1972. The University will be served with telephone services after June 17, 1972 from a new Bell central equipment office located off-campus. The basic services will remain unchanged after this date and the only noticeable effect of the changeover will be the replacement of the 635 prefix on our existing centrex numbers by a new 667 prefix, the last four digits remaining the same. The new number for the York Switchboard, for example, will be 667-2100. Due to the complexity of the work involved in this changeover, it is important to the Telephone Company and is to the ultimate advantage of the University, that as few changes as possible are made to our existing telephone arrangements during the 8-week period preceding June 17. It is necessary, therefore, to place an embargo on telephone work requests received after April 14 until June 17. During this period, only requests of an emergency nature can be handled and these should be directed to the Communications Co-ordinator, Room C25, T.O.B., local 3754. All Departments are asked to co-operate by examining any possible telephone requirements for this period now and submitting the necessary Work Request Form ahead of time. This will, in most cases, enable the required service to be provided in advance of the embargo. Failing this, the required service can only be provided after June 17. The embargo will in no way affect the planned in-service dates for telephones in the new Administrative Studies Building, College 'F' and College 'F' Residence Buildings.

\* Memo to members of the York community from the Department of Safety and Security Services:

Bomb Threats -

A recent incident in which a telephone call was received to the effect that a bomb had been placed in one of the University buildings has again drawn attention to this particular form of mischievous behaviour. Like other calls of a similar nature received in present years, this one proved to be a hoax.

However, the possibility of further calls must be accepted, and while there is no indication that such calls, in this area at least, have been anything but hoaxes, the danger of personal injury in the remote eventuality that a call proved to be genuine cannot be disregarded.

To prevent the disruption of examinations, arrangements have been made for alternative accommodation to be available should bomb threats be received which refer to the buildings in which they are being held. It is proposed that should such an occurrence take place while students are actually writing examinations, the building would be evacuated and they would be required to move to the alternative accommodation to finish.

With regard to bomb-threat calls at other times a list has been compiled to include a representative of each Department, to be notified by telephone in the event of any future calls where they concern the building in which the Department is located.

Those who decide to leave the building should remain in the vicinity. They will be notified by staff of the Department of Safety and Security Services when precautionary measures have been taken and it is deemed safe for them to return to their offices.

Summer Hours, 1972  
YORK CAMPUS
- Last year the University introduced on a trial basis summer hours from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., from the beginning of Daylight Saving in April to the "return-to-school" after the Labour Day weekend. In the rare cases where the summer hours had an adverse effect on required operations it was recognized that the regular hours should be retained. This flexibility was not intended to meet the individual wishes of persons who found the earlier arrival slightly inconvenient. Certainly the change was not initiated to decrease the working day by half an hour.
- A survey conducted in September indicated the majority (80%) of the Divisions and Departments observed the revised hours and were in favour of repeating them in 1972.
- Following discussion of the subject at a meeting of the President's Senior Policy Committee, April 5, there was agreement that summer hours, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., be adopted as the standard for University offices for the period May 1 to Tuesday, September 5, 1972.
- For a number of years Glendon College has been on a summer hours schedule comparable to the above and will continue the practice in 1972.
- \* Graduate students who have successfully completed an oral examination on a thesis or dissertation submitted in partial fulfillment of the requirements of Masters or Doctoral degrees, must subsequently deliver three unbound copies in final acceptable form to the Faculty of Graduate Studies (Room N920, the Ross Building) at least one week prior to the Spring Convocation. Since Friday, June 9, 1972, is the date fixed for Convocation for graduate students, Friday, June 2, 1972, is the last date on which a thesis or dissertation in final form, may be delivered to the Faculty of Graduate Studies by a student who expects to be awarded a graduate degree at the Spring Convocation.
- \* C.G. Dunn, Department of Safety and Security Services advises:  
BOMB THREATS
- A recent incident in which a telephone call was received to the effect that a bomb had been placed in one of the University buildings has again drawn attention to this particular form of mischievous behaviour. Like other calls of a similar nature received in previous years this one proved to be a hoax.
- However, the possibility of further calls must be accepted, and while there is no indication that such calls, in this area at least, have been anything but hoaxes, the danger of personal injury in the remote eventuality that a call proved to be genuine cannot be disregarded.
- To prevent the disruption of examinations, arrangements have been made for alternative accommodation to be available should bomb threats be received which refer to the buildings in which they are being held. It is proposed that should such an occurrence take place while students are actually writing examinations, the building would be evacuated and they would be required to move to the alternative accommodation to finish.
- With regard to bomb-threat calls at other times a list has been compiled to include a representative of each Department, to be notified by telephone in the event of any future calls where they concern the building in which the Department is located.
- Those who decide to leave the building should remain in the vicinity. They will be notified by staff of the Department of Safety and Security Services when precautionary measures have been taken and it is deemed safe for them to return to their offices.

### YORK CAMPUS

Last year the University introduced on a trial basis summer hours from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., from the beginning of Daylight Saving in April to the "return-to-school" after the Labour Day weekend.

In the rare cases where the summer hours had an adverse effect on required operations it was recognized that the regular hours should be retained. This flexibility was not intended to meet the individual wishes of persons who found the earlier arrival slightly inconvenient. Certainly the change was not initiated to decrease the working day by half an hour. A survey conducted in September indicated the majority (80%) of the Divisions and Departments observed the revised hours and were in favour of repeating them in 1972.

Following discussion of the subject at a meeting of the President's Senior Policy Committee April 5, there was agreement that summer hours, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., be adopted as the standard for University offices for the period Monday, May 1 to Tuesday, September 5, 1972. For a number of years Glendon College has been on a summer hours schedule comparable to the above and will continue the practice in 1972.

Last year the University introduced on a trial basis summer hours from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., from the beginning of Daylight Saving in April to the "return-to-school" after the Labour Day weekend.

In the rare cases where the summer hours had an adverse effect on required operations it was recognized that the regular hours should be retained. This flexibility was not intended to meet the individual wishes of persons who found the earlier arrival slightly inconvenient. Certainly the change was not initiated to decrease the working day by half an hour. A survey conducted in September indicated the majority (80%) of the Divisions and Departments observed the revised hours and were in favour of repeating them in 1972.

Following discussion of the subject at a meeting of the President's Senior Policy Committee April 5, there was agreement that summer hours, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., be adopted as the standard for University offices for the period Monday, May 1 to Tuesday, September 5, 1972. For a number of years Glendon College has been on a summer hours schedule comparable to the above and will continue the practice in 1972.

On page 5, the article entitled "The University Budget 1972-73", paragraph 5 should read:  
"The University has budgeted on what might appear on the surface to be quite a substantial contingency basis, an amount of close to \$500 thousand for 1972-73 at this time, partly to provide for normal contingencies and the working out of budget details, but partly as a precaution against under-enrolment."
  
- \* Waste Paper Collection Project  
In response to community enthusiasm, the collection of waste paper for recycling, has been introduced by the University. The project, developed last year by York's Pollution Probe, was sparked again this year by students Mark Plewman and Bob Vorpes who requested that the program be undertaken as university routine carried out by the Department of Physical Plant in collaboration with Pollution Probe.  
Initially only three buildings will participate in this pilot project - the Ross Building, the Temporary Office Building, and the Physical Plant Workshops.  
Two cardboard containers have been provided for each office or area where a suitable amount of waste paper can be expected. Metal staples and clips do not present a problem, but preferably should be kept out of the containers. On Tuesday and Thursday of each week, the cleaning staff will empty the waste paper containers instead of the regular waste baskets. While additional medium-sized containers, clearly marked "waste paper", may be used for excess quantities, any department with a large volume of paper should call local 2373 to arrange for a special pick-up.  
Eventually it is hoped that the paper recycling program may be extended to include the entire campus. The success of this project, the purpose of which is to assist in the reduction of pollution and the number of living trees used to produce paper, depends on the wholehearted co-operation of the university community.
  
- \* Year-End Accounting Procedures

For accounts payable against 1971/72 funds the blue copies must be cleared to Accounting by 3:30 p.m., May 12, 1972.
  
- \* The Chief Accountant's Office advises that after discussion with the Department of Personnel Services, it has been decided to convert to a four-day week in the Accounting Department. The changeover will occur May 1, 1972, and be in effect on a trial basis for four months. The Accounting Department will remain on a five day business week (Monday through Friday), however, business hours will be extended from 8:00 a.m. to 5:45 p.m.
