West Campus Landscaping

The Department of Physical Plant reports that work commenced August 28th on the initial phase of the West Campus Landscape Development Program as projected in the York University Master Plan. The work undertaken at this time includes the extension of the south-west portion of Fraser Drive to the east-west service road, excavation for the upper lake which forms a drainage basin for storm water collected from the campus proper, the construction of a small dam and weir structure to retain the water and control the lake level, construction of a sluiceway and culvert structure to carry the outflow under the west section of Fraser Drive and the grading, sodding and seeding of the balance of the area bounded by the Library Access Road on the north, Fraser Drive on the west, the future college complex on the south and Osgoode Hall, the Administrative Studies and Scott Central Library buildings on the east. The area involved amounts to some 10 acres including the 1.6 acre lake. Surplus excavated material will be deposited in low lying areas on the west side of Fraser Drive preparatory to future development in that area. This project is the culmination of many months of detailed planning carried out by the University's engineering and landscaping consultants, the Aboretum Committee and the Departments of Campus Planning and Physical Plant. This work has been integrated with the development of the York Campus Aboretum, an extensive program of tree planting being actively implemented in consultation with the Arboretum Committee under the chairmanship of Dr. M. Boyer. Consultations have also been held with the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority responsible for Pioneer Village and the development of the Black Creek Conservation area in order to ensure co-ordinated development of the west campus - Black Creek area.

It is anticipated that construction of Fraser Drive, excavation for the lake, the construction of the control structure, and a good portion of the sodding and seeding will be completed this year. The filling of the lake and the balance of sodding and seeding will be carried out in the spring of 1973.

Parking Notice

Registration may be effected by purchasing an Annual Reserved Area Permit (\$75.00) or an Unreserved Area Permit (\$25.00) or by obtaining a Registration Decal, which is issued free of charge. Those persons obtaining a Registration Decal are required to pay a daily parking fee of 50¢, and are permitted to park only in "N" lot.
