- * Five post-graduate awards, the Queen Elizabeth II Ontario Scholarships, will be awarded for 1973-74, each of the value of \$5000. Conditions for application are: candidates must be nearing completion of the Ph.D. degree; minimum requirement is two years of graduate work beyond the Ontario Honours B.A. degree or its equivalent; tenable only at Ontario universities and preference will be given to candidates who are residents of Ontario; available in the fields of social science, humanities and mathematics and considerable weight will be given to expressed interest in or commitment to university teaching; and no other major academic award or paid employment may be accepted during the year which the scholarship is held with the exception of fees received for teaching duties not exceeding ten hours per week. Each candidate must be sponsored by the Dean of Graduate Studies; application forms and further information may be obtained from the Faculty of Graduate Studies and deadline for submission is December 15, 1972.

- * The Association of Commonwealth Universities invites applications for a number of Administrative Travelling Fellowships to be awarded in 1973 to members of the administrative staff of universities. The purpose of this award is to assist a Fellow to visit university centres in the Commonwealth outside his own country and to study matters of professional interest to himself, and of importance to his own university. Applicants must have at least five years' continuous experience in full-time university administration, and hold a post equal or superior in status to that of a university lecturer; applications should be addressed to the Secretary-General, Association of Commonwealth Universities, 36 Gordon Square, London W.C. 1H - OPF, England, and must be made through the Vice-Chancellor (President D. Slater) of the candidate's university. They should include a curriculum vitae, an account of present or prospective duties, and of the candidate's interest or involvement in the subject for the study of which he is seeking a Fellowship. An outline should also be sent stating which commonwealth country or university in which the applicant wishes to spend the Fellowship, the reasons for such a visit, and the likely cost of travel and living expenses involved. It is a condition of the awards that a Fellow shall write a report on his fellowship for the Association. Applications should reach the Secretary-General no later than February 22, 1973.

It should be noted that under the Canada Elections Act, staff eligible to vote shall be granted four consecutive hours in which to cast their vote and employment hours adjusted, if necessary, to permit this. As the polls close at 7:00 p.m., leaving the office at 3:00 p.m. would permit the required number of hours to be available.

The following motion was approved by Senate at its meeting on October 26, 1972, for immediate implementation:

That the Senate adjourn debate on Schedule II of the Report of the Senate Committee on Academic Dismissal (Rules for Reductions in Teaching Staff for Reasons of Budget Necessity) until Wednesday, November 8, 1972, when a special meeting shall be called, at which time a Committee called the Joint Committee on Alternatives shall report to Senate, having:

1. examined the current academic budget;
2. examined the projected income based on enrolments for 1973-74 and concluded that the projections could or could not be changed, in what manner, and to what extent;
3. examined and placed before Senate all alternatives, including new initiatives and all possible retrenchment measures for the period 1973-75, to cutting faculty as a means of introducing budget constraints or reductions;
4. examined with the Board the possibility of deficit financing or alternative arrangements; and
5. formulated comprehensive recommendations in the light of the determined facts which shall be submitted to the relevant units of the University for their examination and comment.

If there seems to be no alternative to terminations of faculty for budgetary purposes, the Committee shall place before Senate a clear and concise statement of the likely number of terminations of faculty.

The Committee shall begin with no assumptions about the validity, financial or academic, of the current operating base of the University Budget, and within it, the various operating budgets.

The Joint Committee on Alternatives shall comprise: Deans, Budget Officers, the President of Y.U.F.A., the Chairman of Senate, the Chairman of A.P.P.C., a representative of Y.U.S.A., a representative of the Senate Committee on Academic Dismissal, a student Senator chosen by the student Senators, and the Chairman of the Council of College Masters. The Committee shall be governed by the rules established by Senate to govern the operations of Senate Committees. Further, it shall have the full support of the staff of the University, and may consult any member or unit of the University. However, all units and officers of the University shall continue to apply themselves to such planning and other measures as presently lie within their responsibility and authority. The Committee shall not be chaired by a Dean, Vice-President, or the President.
