This document, which was proposed by the Senate Committee on Academic Dismissal and approved by the Senate, was not an amendment to the December, 1971 Report of the Senate Committee on Tenure and Promotions.  
Please note that in the event of any inconsistency or conflict arising between this document and the December 1971 Report of the Senate Committee on Tenure and Promotions, "Procedures to Govern the Non-Renewal of Untenured Members of Faculty or Their Advancement to Candidacy" will be considered to be the ones with effect.
  
- \* The Department of Physical Plant announces that, to effect reductions in the University's operating budget, it is expanding its program to conserve electrical energy. The University pays the Borough of North York on the basis of the amount of electricity used and on the electrical load of the campus. Thus savings on the substantial annual expenditure are dependent on lowering the peak load as well as the total electricity consumed.  
A recent thorough study confirms that, due to the physical configuration of certain spaces in buildings, lighting levels are well above those recommended by the Illuminating Engineering Society, a recognized authority in this field. It is therefore considered appropriate to reduce the lighting levels in repetitive type areas with normal usage, such as corridors, washrooms, lounges, offices and classrooms, to at least the minimum standard for institutional type buildings. The Department is confident that such reductions will have no adverse effect on the community or the operations of the University. The program of removing certain lamps will be undertaken by the housekeeping staff and will last several days. This will necessitate a temporary curtailment of housekeeping services.

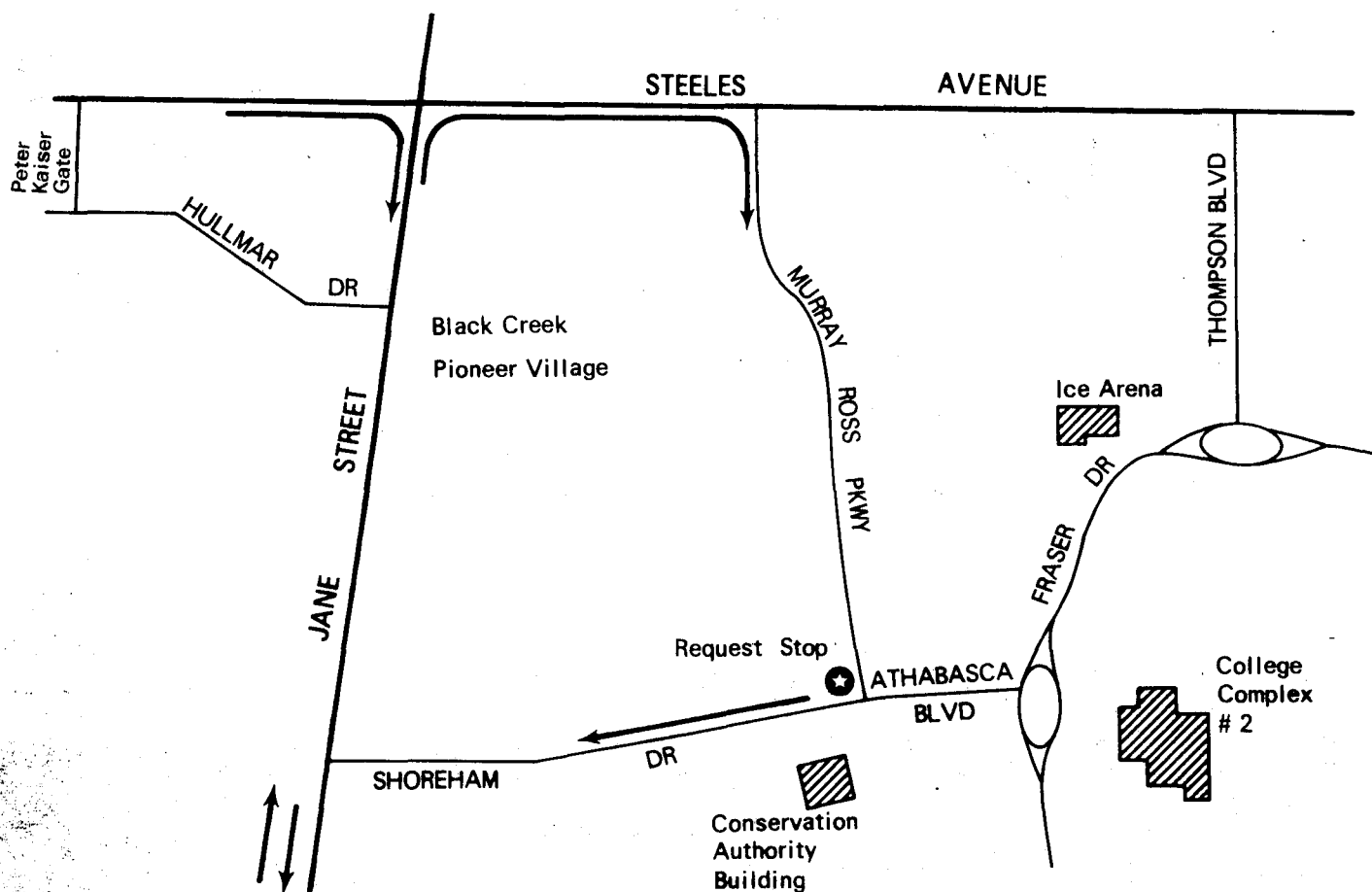

## JANE STREET BUS SERVICE

Effective Sunday, November 26, the TTC are extending the existing service on Jane Street to Provide direct connection between Jane Station and Steeles Avenue. The timetables for this service are attached.

The buses on the new Jane Street service will use two turning loops when they reach Steeles and these loops will be used alternately so that there will be direct service to the western boundary of the campus. The map shows the direction taken by the buses on each loop and their points of exit and entry on Jane Street and Steeles Avenue. The times on the two sets of timetables for south-bound buses are departure times from the junction of the Murray Ross Parkway and Steeles Avenue in the case of the loop east of Jane, and from Peter Kaiser Gate and Steeles on the west loop. For north bound buses the departure times refer to Jane Station. Until the TTC install a permanent bus-stop at the junction of the Murray Ross Parkway and Shoreham Drive, the stop is designated a request stop and passengers should flag the bus down. Timetables are being printed by the TTC and when these are available an announcement will be made in the Bulletin.

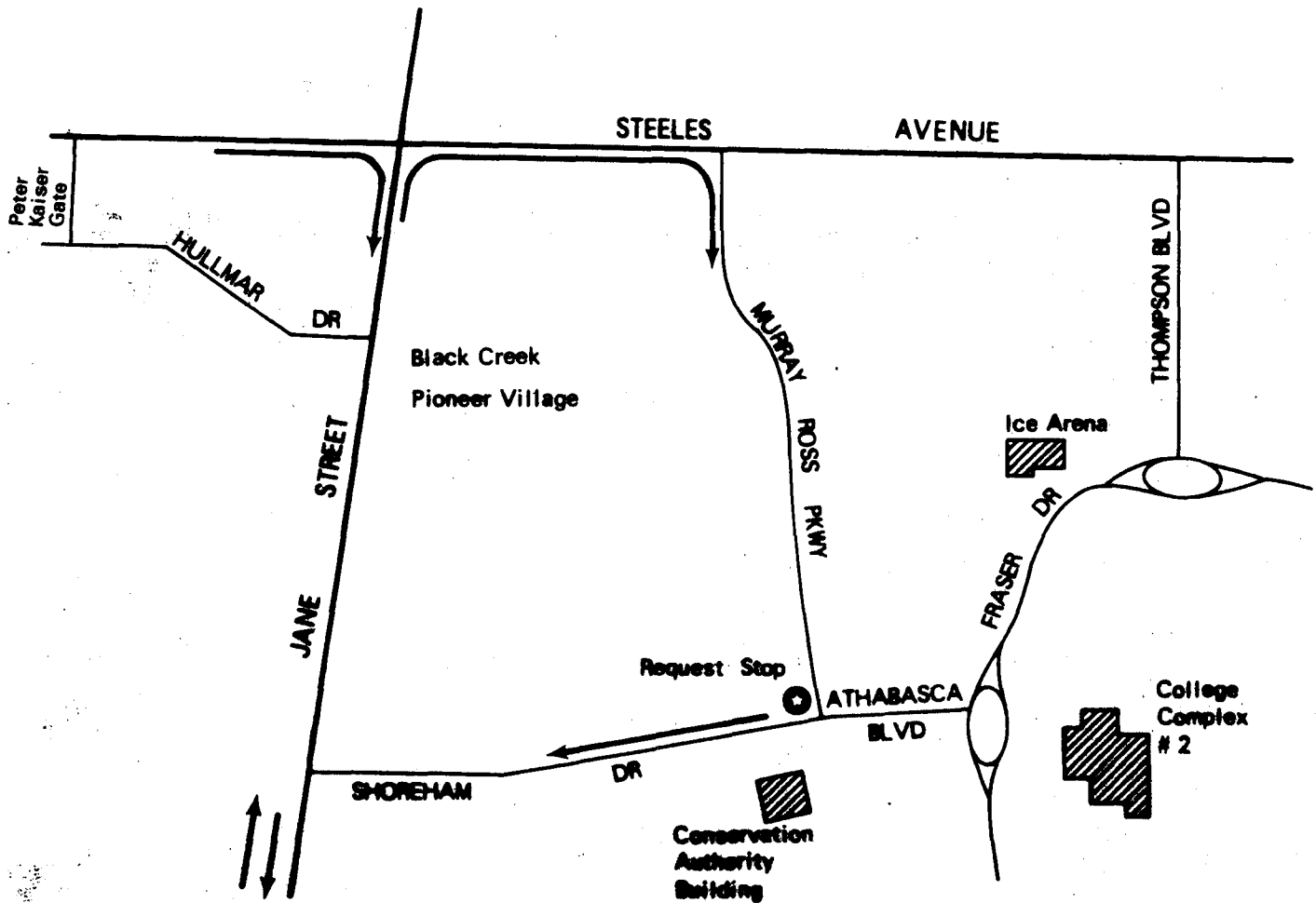

Timetables for this service were published with the Friday, November 24th issue of the Bulletin and a limited number of additional copies are available from the Secretary, C.Y.S.F., Room N111, the Ross Building.

The buses on the new Jane Street service will use two turning loops when they reach Steeles and these loops will be used alternately so that there will be direct service to the western boundary of the campus. The map shows the direction taken by the buses on each loop and their points of exit and entry on Jane Street and Steeles Avenue. The times on the two sets of timetables for south-bound buses are departure times from the junction of the Murray Ross Parkway and Steeles Avenue in the case of the loop east of Jane, and from Peter Kaiser Gate and Steeles on the west loop. For north-bound buses the departure times refer to Jane Station. Until the TTC install a permanent bus-stop at the junction of the Murray Ross Parkway and Shoreham Drive, the stop is designated a request stop and passengers should flag the bus down. Timetables are being printed by the TTC and when these are available an announcement will be made in the Bulletin.
