From January 8 to May 4, the students shall complete three of their five courses, selected from the course offerings in the Divisions of Humanities, Social Science and Language Studies, and the Department of Mathematics. ## Statement from the President

I regret to have to announce to you that Walter S. Tarnopolsky has tendered his resignation as Vice-President, Academic Affairs, of York University. Mr. Tarnopolsky wishes to take up his full-time post as Professor in Osgoode Hall Law School, York University, on 1 January 1973.

Professor Tarnopolsky's decision in the matter is irrevocable and I will have to recommend acceptance of the resignation at the next regular meeting of the Board of Governors of York University.

Because of historical reasons, the circumstances of York University in recent months, and the problems of personnel and administration, Mr. Tarnopolsky concluded that the essential conditions for his effective work as Vice-President, Academic Affairs, did not exist at this time. Moreover, he concluded that it would be in the best interests of the University if he withdrew from that administrative role promptly and took up his teaching duties.

Mr. Tarnopolsky is greatly admired and respected in the academic community generally and at York. He continues to have my complete confidence and I regret that his leadership and wise counsel will not be available as Vice-President, Academic Affairs. We look forward to his continued active participation in the life of the University as a whole, as well as in Osgoode Hall Law School.
