It is with the greatest regret that I have to announce that President David W. Slater has tendered his resignation to the Board, and the Board has accepted the resignation. Dr. Slater's letter of resignation and the Board's press release is being distributed within the University prior to press release at 11:00 a.m., Tuesday, January 23, 1973.

I hope that all members of the University community will recognize the urgent need to work together for the interests of the University as a whole. In order to establish continuity of executive leadership for an interim period until a successor can be chosen by means of an agreed process of consultation throughout the University, I have recommended to the Board the appointment of an acting President and the Board has accepted and acted on this recommendation. Professor Richard Storr, Professor of History in the Faculty of Arts has agreed to serve as a Vice-President and as Acting President, effective today.

Professor Storr wishes it to be known that he is not a candidate for the office of President, and is prepared to vacate the acting presidency when the selection of a successor to Dr. Slater has been achieved through agreed procedures. Professor Storr deserves the support of faculty and students in a most difficult assignment, and on behalf of the Board, I request that each and every member of the York University community try to make his task easier through co-operation and wholehearted support.

Professor Storr was Acting Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies in 1971-72, and is currently co-chairman of the University-wide Committee on The Study of Governance and Administration. Professor Storr joined the Faculty at York in 1968, after serving at the University of Chicago for many years.

To assist Professor Storr in resolving the problems that lie ahead, the Board also wishes to announce the appointment of William Farr as a Vice-President of the University. Mr. Farr is presently Secretary of both Senate and Board, and will continue to have responsibility for the secretariat and certain other University functions. However, his main function will be to provide executive assistance to the Acting President, with duties focussed on the co-ordination of policy planning.

The Board is confident that Professor Storr and Mr. Farr are persons of the highest integrity and sense of responsibility, and knows that they already enjoy high regard throughout the University. Their judgement and energy together with the ongoing support of the senior administrative officers and Deans will help to ensure the continuance of the University's service to the community.

I request that the Board of Governors of York University accept my resignation as President effective June 30, 1973. I also request leave from the duties of President beginning January 23, 1973. In my view, acceptance of these requests is in the best interests of the University.

The position of President involves difficult inter-personal relations and I do not believe that I can be sufficiently effective to my own standards in serving the needs of the University in the present circumstances.

I would like to express my thanks for the support and goodwill extended so generously by many members of the faculty, the staff, students and the Board of York and by York's friends in other educational institutions. I also wish to thank many other people in government, business and the community for their help during my tenure.

It is my hope that all elements of the University will give to my successor their full support toward the realization of the advancement of York.

The Board of Governors of York University announces with great regret the resignation of President D.W. Slater.

The Board of Governors recognizes the great difficulties inherent in the task of administering the affairs of a university, and must accept the conclusion reached by Dr. Slater that a change in the chief executive office is desirable at this time in the interests of the University.

The Board wishes to record its appreciation for the devoted service of Dr. Slater since his appointment on July 1, 1970. The Board has expressed its wish that Dr. Slater will remain with the University in a capacity which will provide him greater opportunity for teaching and research.

The Board is pleased to announce the appointment of Richard Storr, Professor of History at York University since 1968, as Acting President.

An unexpected medical opinion has led to the withdrawal of Dr. Richard Storr's name as Acting President of York University.

Although Dr. Storr's health had been discussed with the Chairman of the Board prior to his appointment as Acting President, he subsequently took medical advice and decided to withdraw from accepting the interim appointment.

On the advice of the Executive Committee of the Senate, and of the Deans, Principals and Vice-Presidents of the University, who met together on the morning of January 24, the Board of Governors has appointed Professor J.W. Yolton as Acting President of the University.

The Board, Senate, Deans, Principals and administrative staff of the University have worked in close and cordial agreement to replace Dr. Storr on short notice. It is expected that machinery will be put in place in the near future to consider the appointment of a full-time successor to Dr. Slater.

### STATEMENT FROM THE PRESIDENT

J.W. YOLTON

As your very newly appointed Acting President I should like to address a few words to the entire community...although I hope you will understand that I have not been long enough in office to offer more than tentative and perhaps to some extent superficial comments.

This University has recently been through troubled times...and still more difficult decisions lie ahead. As a community we have much work before us... budgetary problems, enrollment questions, and, perhaps of more long-range importance, the selection of a new President to succeed Dr. Slater.

Many members of our community, working tirelessly through the past weeks, have already started to move toward solutions to our budgetary and enrollment problems and both the Senate and the Board of Governors have taken initial steps towards setting up a Presidential Search Committee.

I have the fullest confidence that with the enduring efforts of all members of our community and the support and advice which I know I can count on as your Acting President, we will resolve our difficulties and ensure the continuing excellence of this University.

I think it is most important that we maintain our perspective at this time. During recent weeks the external community, quite understandably, and to some extent we ourselves, have concentrated on our administrative problems. But during these times the University has continued with its primary tasks...teaching, learning, and research...and these serious and exciting functions are the backbone of our University and our raison d'être. Let them continue to be so and let this University continue to make significant contributions to higher learning for which it has gained such an enviable reputation.

My role as Acting President is to do what I can - with help from all segments of the York community - to thread our way through the financial and enrollment difficulties for 1973-74. I hope I will also be able to continue my own activities as teacher and scholar during this period. I am absolutely convinced of York's high quality as a university. My hope for those outside York is that they will also come to recognize the contributions York has been making to Ontario, Canada and to the world of learning. I know I can count on faculty, students, and support staff to continue to make York an important institution of higher learning.
