1. YORK HANDBOOK SUPPLEMENT

The Daily Bulletin makes its major contribution to the community by disseminating information on a wide range of topics, but, because its major purpose is to publish information that remains current for only a short time, it is not intended to be the ideal vehicle for items that retain their currency for an extended period and to which reference must occasionally be made.

To meet this need, the Office of the Vice-President (Administration) will publish (or republish) certain items of this kind as a supplement to the York Handbook. The Supplement forms part of the Bulletin and may be detached and filed in the Handbook binder for reference.

This method of publication has been made possible by the cooperation of the Director of Information and Publications. Because of the large number of items that have to be carried by the Bulletin, the Supplement can only appear on an occasional basis when space is available. It should also be noted that any item a department considers particularly suitable for republication in the Supplement should be so marked when it is first submitted to the Department of Information for publication in the Bulletin. The Bulletin editor will then submit the item to the Office of the Vice-President (Administration) for republication in the Supplement when space is available. The Office of the Vice-President (Administration) reserves the right, in consultation with the originator, to edit any item that may be overly long or might otherwise benefit from editing.

All directives and other announcements published in the Supplement have the force of official University policy and administrative officers are requested to keep all issues of the Supplement on file during the period of their currency.

2. UNIVERSITY POLICIES AND PROCEDURES (LIMITED DISTRIBUTIONS)

The complete York Handbook containing the Telephone Directory and the Services, Practices, and Policies sections is distributed to all holders of the Telephone Directory. This wide distribution is deliberate and is intended to provide members of the community with a directory of the services available on campus and to provide a ready-reference to current University practices and policies.

There are a number of official University practices and policies, however, which, while they are of vital interest to those actively engaged in the activities with which the policies deal, are of little day-to-day interest to the majority of the community. Such publications are normally given limited distribution by their originators but must, nevertheless, be accessible as public University documents. Those originating in the Office of the Vice-President (Administration) can be provided with an index in the Handbook, but unless those distributed by other offices and departments have their existence recorded they remain inaccessible as University documents.

In order to establish a common format which will allow such documents to be filed in the Handbook and to facilitate the preparation of an index from time to time, please follow the procedure set out below.

1. Reproduce each document on punched pages (3 quarter-inch holes) each 8" x 5" for insertion in the Handbook, by using a photo-reduction of 18%.

To achieve this final size, it is necessary to type the original, in single space within a rectangle 9 1/4" x 5 1/8", running each line right out to the edges of the rectangle, i.e. with no margins. A master backing sheet makes this procedure a simple matter. (An IBM Adjutant 12-pitch type-ball produces excellent copy, but the actual type-face used is not critical.)

2. To achieve a suitable consistency in format, and to clarify the minor technical details involved (including the general styling of headings, indentations, numbering of paragraphs and subparagraphs, spacing, page-numbering, etc.) all originators are asked to consult the Assistant to

the Vice-President (Administration), Ross S912, 3070, before any document is reproduced. This consultation is advisory only, and does not extend to writing and editing, or to the actual reproduction of any item.

3. Send two copies of every item published to the Office of the Vice-President (Administration) S912 Ross (2234) so that an updated index can be issued from time to time for insertion in the Handbook.
