* YEAR-END ACCOUNTING PROCEDURES - The office of the Chief Accountant wishes to remind the community of specific deadline dates for the completion of year-end statements. These dates were circulated on March 12, 1973, and reference is made in particular to the following:

1. Expense Advances - An Expense Report is to be submitted to the Accounting Department by 10:00 a.m., May 10, 1973, for all advances outstanding at April 30, 1973.
2. Miscellaneous Payroll - An "Authorization of Payment of Temporary Services" form must be completed and received in the Payroll Office by 5:00 p.m., May 3, 1973, for all casual assistants who have rendered service up to and including April 30, 1973. Cheques will be mailed by May 10, 1973.
3. Supplier's Invoices - Goods or services received in a fiscal year are charged to the budget appropriation for that year. There is no method by which funds appropriated for use in one period can be used for prepayment of goods or services or to effect any carry over into the next. Supplier's invoices for goods or services, which are received prior to April 30, 1973, will be charged to the current year's budget. Departments are requested to indicate the date of receipt of all goods or services on the receiving copy (blue) of the purchase order and submit this copy to the Purchasing Department immediately after receipt of goods or services. For accounts payable against 1972-73 funds the blue copies must be cleared to Purchasing by 10:00 a.m., Thursday, May 10, 1973.

June 2 10:30 a.m. - Atkinson College - Colonel C.P. Stacey, O.B.E., C.D., will receive the honorary Doctor of Laws Degree. Colonel Stacey, eminent historian, is a distinguished scholar in the field of military affairs, particularly Canadian military history. Professor of History at the University of Toronto since 1960, Colonel Stacey was named University Professor at that University in January of this year - he is the fifth person to receive that title. Colonel Stacey received a Governor-General's Award for The Canadian Army 1939-45, An Official History Summary (1948). In 1972, for his book, Arms, Men and Governments (1970), he was awarded the Albert P. Corey Prize in Canadian Relations jointly by the Canadian and American Historical Associations. Colonel Stacey will deliver the convocation address.

In 1972, he was named Companion of the Order of Canada. Professor Davies will give the convocation address.

Dr. Gerald P. Cosgrave has made a significant contribution to the field of vocational and professional counselling. Since 1965, as Director of the Counselling Foundation of Canada, Dr. Cosgrave has channelled funds into the area of vocational counselling. Author of more than fifty articles, reports and papers on such subjects as occupational and vocational counselling, Dr. Cosgrave for the past ten years has worked at York's Psychological Services Department.

- * A new service will be provided this summer for students seeking information about or entering into a program of study at York. The Centre for Advising, Registration and Enrolment (C.A.R.E.), to be located in Room 245, Vanier College, has been established to bring together three hitherto separate services. It will involve the three undergraduate Faculties of Arts, Fine Arts and Science. CARE will be staffed by a team of 16 full-time faculty who will receive an orientation to familiarize them with faculty regulations, course offerings available to students (including all college tutorials), the college system (including procedures for entering residence), O.S.A.P. regulations, scholarship regulations and admissions regulations. Three Academic Advisors are the Coordinators of CARE: Terry Boyd, Vanier College; Russell Chace, Founders College; and Elaine Newton, Calumet College. CARE will operate during the following hours: 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Monday to Thursday; and 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Friday. CARE will provide two basic services:
 - a) General advising concerning York programs and faculties for prospective students seeking information who have not yet decided on a university.
 - b) Detailed advising on specific programs of study at York for students who have confirmed that they will register at York. This detailed advising will involve working out a 'conflict free' timetable within the regulations of the first year program for the student, and enrolling the student in his course selection (including college tutorials) at the time of the advising session.
 CARE is prepared to do general advising for students requesting advanced standing and special students; and will handle enrolment of such students in first and second year courses. In addition, CARE Advisors will be prepared to interview special and problem admissions and make recommendations concerning those to the Admissions Committee. The Centre for Advising, Registration and Enrolment will begin operation on May 28 and will continue until September 14. After September 14, the Offices of Student Programs will handle late registrations.
