* There have been requests for clarification on the use of the Postal Codes by York University mailers, since confusion does exist between Postal Codes and Responsibility Centre numbers. The following information should show the distinction between the Responsibility Centre number (used for postal charges) and the Postal Codes (used for the delivery of mail):

1. York University Envelopes - should bear the Responsibility Centre number only. This number will enable the York Postal staff to allocate the postage charges correctly for all outgoing mail.
2. York University Stationery - should include the Postal Code, assigned to specific buildings on campus by the Canada Post Office, and presumably to which all replies will be addressed.

- * As members of the York community know, food prices during the past few weeks have experienced a rather dramatic upward surge at all levels. In the firm belief that the levels reached would be of short duration, and in the interest of trying to hold down costs to all members of the community, the Food Services Division has managed to maintain the price schedules set on June 1, 1973. This schedule will be held as long as possible but, should commodity markets continue to rise, the prices quoted will have to undergo some revision. Should this be necessary, ample notice will be given to all concerned.
- * The final date for receipt of changes, deletions and additions to the new York Telephone Directory is Monday, September 10. The new Directory will be issued on November 1. Any enquiries should be directed to the Communications Department at local 2337.
- * Jewish Student Federation - as part of the Orientation Week program of events, the Federation will hold an Open House from 11:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. at their office in Room 106, Central Square. - * Amendment to the Immigration Appeal Board Act: Implications for those who have left the country for a period of time after November 30, 1972 -
"As to the effect of these amendments on students who, although here on November 30, 1972, left Canada on holidays since then, such students are not eligible for the status adjustment program. Any such person wishing to apply for permanent residence would be welcome to do so at one of our offices outside Canada. Others who have planned overseas holidays would lose their eligibility under the adjustment program if they should leave Canada."
The Minister's statement is a strict interpretation of the Amendment which in itself makes no provision for eligibility of an applicant under the adjustment program if he has left Canada after November 30, 1972. However, such an applicant will be given full consideration. Granting of landed status will have to be dealt with under some other authority than the Act, e.g. an Order-in-Council. There is no guarantee that all persons in this situation will be granted landed status, but their applications will be considered. The Department warns that it may take somewhat longer to deal with these applications especially in centres where there is a heavy load of work.

- * Amendment to the Immigration Appeal Board Act: Implications for those who have left the country for a period of time after November 30, 1972 -
"As to the effect of these amendments on students who, although here on November 30, 1972, left Canada on holidays since then, such students are not eligible for the status adjustment program. Any such person wishing to apply for permanent residence would be welcome to do so at one of our offices outside Canada. Others who have planned overseas holidays would lose their eligibility under the adjustment program if they should leave Canada."
The Minister's statement is a strict interpretation of the Amendment which in itself makes no provision for eligibility of an applicant under the adjustment program if he has left Canada after November 30, 1972. However, such an applicant will be given full consideration. Granting of landed status will have to be dealt with under some other authority than the Act, e.g. an Order-in-Council. There is no guarantee that all persons in this situation will be granted landed status, but their applications will be considered. The Department warns that it may take somewhat longer to deal with these applications especially in centres where there is a heavy load of work.

- * The President has established a "Fortnightly Forum" which will present a number of faculty members talking about their current research or some topic arising out of their research. The first lecture in this new series will take place on October 4 from 4:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. in the Faculty Lounge, 8th floor, the Ross Building. Professor M. Chevalier of the Faculty of Environmental Studies will speak on "What we know and what we don't know about large-scale problems: the environment as an example." - * The Minister of Manpower and Immigration recently introduced changes in the immigration legislation which may affect members of the York faculty. According to this legislation, all those who entered the country prior to November 30, 1972 (except those on Minister's permits or students bonded to return to their own countries or those who fall into prohibited classes otherwise than under the immigration legislation) will be allowed the opportunity to apply for landed immigrant status within sixty days of the proclamation. It is important to note that this applies not only to those who entered the country illegally, but also to those who came legally and opted for an employment visa rather than landed immigrant status and then found that after November 30, 1972, they could not change their status. All those who entered this country legally or illegally (except for the prohibited groups noted above) will have the right under the new legislation to apply for landed immigrant status if they so desire, but within the prescribed period. They will also have the full rights of appeal if their application is rejected by the Department. After that they will almost certainly have to return to their home country in order to make application for landed immigrant status. The last possible date for anyone who wishes to apply from within this country for landed immigrant status is October 15, 1973.
- Implications for those who have left the country for a period of time after November 30, 1972 - (the following is an excerpt from a statement by the Minister of Manpower and Immigration) - "As to the effect of these amendments on students who, although here on November 30, 1972, left Canada on holidays since then, such students are not eligible for the status adjustment program. Any such person wishing to apply for permanent residence would be welcome to do so at one of our offices outside Canada. Others who have planned overseas holidays would lose their eligibility under the adjustment program if they should leave Canada."
