- * The representatives of the McEuen Trust may award for the 1974-75 session, a scholarship tenable either in the United College or St. Mary's College in the University of St. Andrews (Scotland). The period of tenure of the Scholarship will be three years in the case of a candidate reading for an ordinary degree and four years for an honours degree. The annual value of the scholarship will be at the discretion of the Trustees, but will be sufficient to cover tuition and other fees, residence and travel to and from the College, and a personal allowance. The candidate must be a male of Canadian domicile, not more than twenty-one years of age; attend a recognized university or institution of equivalent status in the provinces of Ontario or Quebec; must be either of proven Scottish descent, or the son of an alumnus; and be required to live in a hall of residence during the first year of tenure. - * University Closing Due to Extreme Weather Conditions: The approach of winter suggests the need to draw attention to University policy with regard to closing due to severe weather causing hazardous road conditions. As a large community with academic schedules to meet and many members to serve, the importance of avoiding disruption is evident. There are times, however, when public safety indicates temporary interruption of the regular routines of the University. Hopefully, such occasions will be rare. The information given below is provided for the guidance of York members. It should be noted that, because a storm may coincide with special events such as examinations, visits by distinguished guests, and special meetings which would be particularly difficult to re-schedule, it is not the intention of this policy to require the cancellation of such events. Whether or not they are cancelled is at the discretion of those directly responsible. When severe weather conditions occur before the University opens in the morning, on the authority of the President, an announcement temporarily suspending classes and office attendance will be made on the following radio stations as soon after 7:00 a.m. as possible:

Radio York will carry the same message after 8:00 a.m.

When severe weather conditions occur, or are reported as imminent by the meteorological services of the Provincial Government, after the University has opened for the day, on the authority of the President, the Office of the Vice-President (Administration) will notify the head of each major division and administrative department that the University will be closed from a specific time that day. The person so informed will then be responsible for passing on the message to everyone in his unit. An announcement will also be made over Radio York. Unless such announcements are made, members of the community will be expected to maintain regular schedules.

H. IAN MACDONALD APPOINTED PRESIDENT

The appointment of H. Ian Macdonald, Deputy Treasurer and Deputy Minister of Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs of the Government of Ontario, as President Elect of York University was announced yesterday by Dr. Robert M. MacIntosh, Chairman of the Board of Governors.

The appointment will be effective July 1st, 1974, and is for a term of five years, renewable for a further five years. Mr. Macdonald has also been appointed Professor in the Faculty of Administrative Studies effective the same date.

Mr. Macdonald will succeed Dr. John Yolton who has served as Acting President of the University since January, 1973.

In announcing the appointment Dr. MacIntosh paid tribute to Dr. Yolton who "has served and is serving this University so well". Dr. Yolton plans to take a sabbatical year starting July 1st, 1974.

Dr. MacIntosh also expressed his appreciation of the interest in the University demonstrated by the other nominees, particularly Dr. Brian Wilson, Vice-President (Academic) of Simon Fraser University, who was one of the two final candidates for the Office, "all of whom had the highest qualifications, making our decision extremely difficult".

In order to standardize the procedures by which members of the community obtain a Special Occasion Permit, the L.L.B.O. and York University have mutually agreed upon the following conditions:
1. All Special Occasion Permits, not normally obtained by G.B.I. Inc. or Cafe Terrasse, will be obtained via the University Food Services only.
 2. Persons wishing a Special Occasion Permit will make application to - F. Leopold, Room 013, Founders College (for York campus; 667-2541) or J. Lamoureux, York Hall (for Glendon campus; 487-6197) - at least seven days in advance of the event as the L.L.B.O. require five day's notice.
 3. A specially designed ink stamp, exclusive to York University, will be used on all approved applications. Applications not bearing this approval stamp will be returned to the University and no permit will be issued against that application.
- It must be noted that the "Applicant" (i.e. the person who signs the application on behalf of the group or party holding the function) becomes legally responsible for the adherence to all regulations pertaining to the Special Occasion Permit. Except where Green Bush Inn and Cafe Terrasse are the licencing agent, all services required for any function will be provided exclusively by York University Food Services.
