- * SUMMER HOURS, 1974 - For the past three years the University offices have operated on summer hours from 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. commencing with Daylight Saving in April and ending with the 'return-to-school' after the Labour Day weekend. This practice will be continued this year from Monday, April 29 through Friday, August 30, 1974, both dates inclusive. In the past, in the few cases where the summer hours had an adverse effect on required operations, it was recognized that the regular hours should be retained. The basic purpose is to maintain effectively a wide variety of University services while recognizing the convenience to the majority of the community.
For a number of years Glendon College has been on a summer hours schedule comparable to the above, and will continue the practice in 1974.
