# NEW ONTARIO COUNCIL ON UNIVERSITY AFFAIRS:

An Ontario Council on University Affairs will be established to advise the government on the Province's university system. The Ministry of Colleges and Universities reports that legislation to set up the new Council has been introduced in the Ontario Legislature. The Council will be headed by a full-time Chairman, Dr. Stefan Dupré, currently Chairman of the Department of Political Economy at the University of Toronto. The Council will make recommendations to the Minister of Colleges and Universities on matters such as the eligibility of programs for funding, total funding requirements of Ontario universities and allocation of the funds. It will be empowered to hold public meetings, publish minutes of its meetings, and make annual reports to the Legislature. The Council has been created in response to the recommendations of the university community in general, and of bodies such as the Commission on Post-Secondary Education in Ontario, the Council of Ontario Universities, and the Committee on University Affairs. It replaces the Committee on University Affairs and is intended to act as a strengthened 'buffer' between the universities and the provincial government. In addition to the Chairman, the Council will have at least eleven other members. Members will be appointed by the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council and are expected to be selected from a broad cross-section of the public as well as the university community.

Participants in a ceremonial function at which academic dress is worn are normally presumed to wear the cap, gown and hood of an academic degree which they hold (usually the highest degree they hold). Every participant who owns his own academic dress is encouraged to wear this.

While the University can make certain items of academic dress available to faculty and staff who wish them, this supply does not include hoods for degrees conferred by other universities. If you wish to purchase or rent the hood or the complete dress for a degree which you hold, the robemakers to the University (Harcourts Limited, 26 Duncan Street, Toronto - 364-4408) may be able to assist you.

If you do not own the academic dress to which you are entitled by virtue of a degree which you hold (or if you own merely the hood) you can rent alternative academic dress from the University's own stock, in this University.

### Α.

If you will bring your own hood, but need a gown and/or cap: If you have your own hood, but not your own gown, you should rent a Teaching Gown (i.e. Master's Gown) from the University

The York Robe may not be worn with a hood (even if you are on Senate). If the supply of Teaching Gowns is insufficient, a Bachelor's Gown will be substituted.

If you have your own hood, but not your own cap, you should rent the headgear indicated on the rental form for your status within the University (or a mortarboard, if the degree for which you have a hood requires a mortarboard).

#### Β. If you do not have your own hood:

If you do not have your own hood, you should rent a cap and gown according to your status within the University, as indicated on the order form.

- C. If you wish to rent academic dress from University stocks:
  - Complete and mail the rental form distributed with Thursday's Bulletin, to the a) Bookstore; or
  - Reserve your academic dress in person at the Bookstore, Central Square, during the preb) registration times, namely May 27 - May 31 and June 4 - June 7, daily from 12:00 noon to 3:00 p.m.; or
  - Pick up and return your academic dress in the robe rental rooms (S166 & S167, the Ross c) Building) in accordance with the robe room opening times. Academic dress must be returned before the robe rooms close on the day of the convocation the dress is rented for. Any other time please return them to Mrs. Noell at the Bookstore.
  - d) Pay rental fee by cash or cheque not by payroll deduction and not by charging it to a departmental account. Note that a deposit of \$4.00 is required, which is refundable on return of the rented garments on the day of convocation, before the Robe rooms close. This has become necessary because of difficulties experienced in retrieving rented garments after ceremonies.
