As part of this continuing effort, the Administration has approved the increase of building temperatures during this summer to 78°F. It is proposed that this measure be applied selectively on a trial basis, due recognition will be given to special requirements in various buildings. Members of the University community are asked for cooperation and support for this program.

Recipients were chosen from 173 candidates who entered the first two competitions for Senior Arts Grants for the year 1974-75. The grants enable artists to devote four months or more to a specific project or program of work, or to work freely. The grants are worth up to \$15,000 for the length of the program, to cover living expenses, production costs and travel costs necessary to the program.
