### RHODES SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS INVITED

- The National Research Council of Canada invites applications from established Canadian scientists for financial support for visits to Brazil, Czechoslovakia, France and the U.S.S.R. on the basis of agreements with those countries which provide for exchanges of scientists and engineers in those disciplines which normally receive support from NRC, to take place in 1975.
