Ontario Universities' Library Cooperative System (O.U.L.C.S.), Inter-University Borrowing Project: A new Inter-University Borrowing scheme for the sharing of library materials is now in operation. Under the scheme, faculty members, graduate students and senior staff members from York will be able to borrow directly from other participating libraries, while faculty members, graduate students and senior staff members from elsewhere may borrow personally from York. Each participating university has agreed to take full responsibility for the safe return of any materials borrowed, and for any has agreed to take full responsibility for the safe return of any materials borrowed, and for any charges incurred by its own people. Sanctions will be applied where necessary by home universities to prevent abuse of the service. Institutions participating initially will be Guelph, Lakehead, Laurentian, McMaster, Queen's, Toronto, Trent, Western, Windsor and York. It is expected that more will join in the near future. The basic procedure will entail a special borrower's card and special borrowing forms (one to be completed for each item, at the host library). Books may be returned at either library. Only catalogued monographs may be borrowed; persons requesting journal articles will need to order

photocopies on a cash basis or make them on coin-operated machines. Material may be borrowed for the loan period specified by the lending library, no renewals will be permitted and no reserve requests will be accepted. Overdue fines will be levied at the rate of 20 cents per item per day, and \$1.00 per item per day if an overdue recall notice is issued. While this development will obviously place a very heavy burden on some libraries, the COU Board for Library Coordination has commended it as a major step forward in the cooperative use of Ontario's

academic library resources.

UNIVERSITY CLOSING DUE TO EXTREME WEATHER CONDITIONS: The approaching of winter calls for the annual notice of policy with regard to the closing of the University due to extreme weather conditions. As a large community with academic schedules to meet and many members to serve, the importance of avoiding disruption is evident. There are times, however, when public safety indicates temporary interruption of the regular routines of the University. Hopefully, such occasions will be rare. information given below is provided for the guidance of York members. The It should be noted that because a storm may coincide with special events such as examinations, visits

by distinguished guests, and special meetings which would be particularly difficult to reschedule, it is not the intention of this policy to require the cancellation of such events. Whether or not they are cancelled is at the discretion of those directly responsible.

When severe weather conditions occur before the University opens in the morning, on the authority of the President and the Chairman of Senate, an announcement suspending classes and office attendance will be made on the following radio stations as soon after 7:00 a.m. as possible:


Radio York will carry the same message after 8:00 a.m.

When severe weather conditions occur, or are reported as imminent by the meteorological services of the Provincial Government, after the University has opened for the day, on the authority of the President and the Chairman of Senate, the Office of the Vice-President (Administration) will notify the head of each major division and administrative department that the University will be closed from a specific time that day. The person so informed will then be responsible for passing on the message to everyone in his unit. Announcement will also be made over Radio York.

The Safety Officer of the Department of Safety and Security Services advises that with the approach of the festive season special care should be taken when selecting Christmas trees and decorations for installation in University buildings. For fire safety purposes the tree should be fairly fresh with firm needles: saw the butt at an angle one inch above the original cut, and stand in water and support firmly. Place away from all heat sources and where exits will not be blocked. Do not use open flame devices such as candles; use only CSA or ULC approved lighting sets (these should be tested and checked for wear prior to use). Indirect illumination is recommended for metal type trees, as they can become energized if equipped with electric light sets. Decorations should be of the flameproof or non-combustible type, and all waste wrappings should be promptly collected and disposed of. Most importantly, keep matches and smoking materials at a safe distance from the tree. Arrangements for the inspection of these installations may be made by contacting the Safety Officer at local -3351.



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
