- \* The Department of Physical Plant wishes to advise the community of a new Service Request form to streamline present procedures, and to enable the Department to improve its service to the University community. The old Work Request/Work Order format has been replaced by these new forms. The new Service Request is a 6 page form, pre-assembled with one-time-only carbon bound in. It replaces not only the old Work Request form used by the York Community as a whole, but also the Department of Physical Plant Work Order. The use of the terms work request, work order, standing work order, P.P. number, etc., have been avoided since the Service Request replaces all of these. The instructions for the use of the new forms are as outlined on the reverse of each copy. The new forms can be obtained by calling local -3231. - \* Snow Emergency: All members of the community are advised that when a Snow Emergency condition is declared by Metropolitan Toronto or at the University, the following restrictions on parking will be imposed in order to facilitate the removal of snow:
  1. Curb parking will not be permitted in the peripheral (unreserved) lots.
  2. Between midnight and 8:00 a.m., cars left overnight in peripheral lots will be required to be parked in designated areas in the front portion of the lots.
  3. Between midnight and 8:00 a.m., no parking will be permitted on any campus roads including those where parking is normally allowed i.e. Ottawa Road, and the road adjacent to the Temporary Office Building.
  4. Between midnight and 8:00 a.m., no parking will be permitted in any reserved area.

The University reserved the right to suspend parking temporarily in any area for emergencies - York Campus Parking and Traffic Regulations 74/75. When a Snow Emergency condition is declared in Metropolitan Toronto, this is promulgated through local radio stations; if it is found necessary to declare an emergency at the University at any other time, this will be carried by Radio York. "Snow Emergency" signs will also be displayed at all entrances to the campus. The degree of cooperation by members of the community will determine the effectiveness of snow removal, which presents problems due to the substantial number of vehicles belonging to residents which are parked on campus overnight. The above measures will enable a more efficient use to be made of snow clearing equipment, particularly during the night hours, proving beneficial to all. [C.G.   - \* ONTARIO UNIVERSITIES' LIBRARY COOPERATIVE SYSTEM (O.U.L.C.S.), INTER-UNIVERSITY BORROWING PROJECT: A new Inter-University Borrowing scheme for the sharing of library materials is now in operation. Under the scheme, faculty members, graduate students and senior staff members from York will be able to borrow directly from other participating libraries, while faculty members, graduate students and senior staff members from elsewhere may borrow only from York. Each participating university has agreed to take full responsibility for the safe return of any materials borrowed, and for any charges incurred by its own people. Sanctions will be applied where necessary by home universities to prevent abuse of the service. Institutions participating initially will be Guelph, Lakehead, Laurentian, McMaster, Queen's, Toronto, Trent, Western, Windsor and York. It is expected that more will join in the near future. The basic procedure will entail a special borrower's card and special borrowing forms (one to be completed for each item, at the host library). Books may be returned at either library. Only catalogued monographs may be borrowed; persons requesting journal articles will need to order photocopies on a cash basis or make them on coin-operated machines. Material may be borrowed for the loan period specified by the lending library, no renewals will be permitted and no reserve requests will be accepted. Overdue fines will be levied at the rate of 20 cents per item per day, and \$1.00 per item per day if an overdue recall notice is issued. While this development will obviously place a very heavy burden on some libraries, the COU Board for Library Coordination has commended it as a major step forward in the cooperative use of Ontario's academic library resources.
