SUPPLEMENTARY GRANT ANNOUNCED

York University has received a supplementary operating grant of \$750,000 from the Ministry of Colleges and Universities for 1975-76. This compares with the current year's supplementary grant of \$260,000. Strenuous efforts had been made through the winter to convince the ministry and Ontario Council on University Affairs to support a large increase. The grant is part of a total of \$7,234,000 distributed by the Ministry of Colleges and Universities to Ontario universities with "special financial problems". Also it was announced that the special grant for the added costs of bilingualism at Glendon College will be increased from \$128,000 to \$140,000. The effect of these decisions and of the pegging of the Basic Income Unit at a value of \$2,108 for 1975-76 is to increase York's general operating grant from the province by 14.9% for next year. The government's position that student tuition fees may not be increased has not changed, however, with the result that York's total grant and fee revenue for 1975-76 will increase by only 11.6%.
