## GENERAL

- \* The Presidential Advisory Committee on Parking and the Director, Safety and Security Services, recently reviewed the 1975/76 budget for the parking system on York campus. It was noted that estimated costs for 1975/76 will be greater than anticipated revenues, resulting in a deficit position. As no government or university funds are available for the construction, maintenance or operation of the parking system, annual costs must be met fully by the drivers using the facilities. Accordingly, it was recommended to the President and the Board of Governors that, effective July 1, 1975, the following scale of parking fees be approved for York campus:

Annual Reserved	\$100.00
Annual Unreserved	35.00
Daily (M Lot)	.75
Hourly (DD & FF Lots)	.50 for first hour, 25¢ for each successive hour for a maximum of \$1.50 a day
Hourly (Meters)	.20 per hour

Approval of the new fee structure has now been received. If the costs of improvements to GG and HH lots prove reasonable, it is anticipated that further increases in fees can be avoided until 1977. Reserved parking fees may be paid in four monthly payroll deductions of \$25.00 each, and unreserved parking fees by two monthly deductions of \$17.50 each. Drivers wishing reserved parking privileges are urged to make early arrangements with the Parking Office.
