**SYMPOSIUM ON HIGHER EDUCATION:** Four distinguished guests will be featured when York holds the Symposium on Higher Education to honour Dr. Murray G. Ross, President Emeritus, on October 9. The Symposium will begin at 10:00 a.m. with opening remarks by President H. Ian Macdonald. Dr. Claude Bissell, University Professor and former President of the University of Toronto, will speak from 10:30 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. At 11:00 a.m., the Symposium will be addressed by Dr. Reva Gerstein, Member of the Ontario Council on University Affairs. The afternoon session, commencing at 2:00 p.m., will feature Dr. J.B. Macdonald, Executive Director of the Council of Ontario Universities, and Mr. Walter G. Pitman, President of Ryerson Polytechnical Institute. The Symposium will explore key academic issues facing universities of the future and the role of universities in tomorrow's society; and discussion periods will take place after each session. The Symposium will be held in the Senate Chamber (Room S915) of the Ross Building and all members of the York community are invited to attend.

Firstly, the Ontario Labour Relations Board has ruled that Y.U.S.A. had insufficient membership for automatic certification and therefore a vote will be conducted. Details necessary for conducting this vote are currently being worked out but the Board expects it will take place in three to four weeks time. All staff members within the bargaining unit, regardless of whether or not they are presently members of Y.U.S.A. will be eligible to vote.

Secondly, as a result of meetings at the Hearings, the number of positions in dispute - ie. those where no agreement has been reached over whether or not they fall within the defined bargaining unit - has fallen to 50. Of the original 180 positions to be resolved, 84 are now agreed upon as being outside the unit, 46 are in the unit, and the Board will only be called upon to rule on that remaining 50.

Memorandum to Support Staff from Department of Personnel Services re. Representation Vote - Y.U.S.A.

The Ontario Labour Relations Board will supervise the taking of a vote on campus on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, November 5, 6 and 7. Voters Lists will be posted in 30 campus locations, along with information on polling times and places. The lists will identify clearly all persons entitled to vote, who in turn would be members of any resulting bargaining unit.

The following information is provided in response to many questions from staff members:

- 1) Employees need not be members of Y.U.S.A. to be eligible to vote.
- 2) If a majority of the employees who actually vote favour representation by Y.U.S.A., the Labour Relations Board will then certify Y.U.S.A. as bargaining agent for all clerical, secretarial, laboratory and technical staff, with the exception of those excluded by the agreement of Y.U.S.A. and the University or, where applicable, by ruling of the Labour Relations Board.
- 3) Certification would mean that individual staff members would be bound by the terms of the formal Collective Agreement, which would be negotiated between the University and representatives of Y.U.S.A. Such Collective Agreement could alter and would certainly formalize such matters as hours of work, promotion, demotion, layoff, recall, transfers, leaves of absence, working rules and employee discipline, as well as monetary matters.
- 4) The Ontario Labour Relations Act does not provide for compulsory arbitration as a means of settling a Collective Agreement.

Staff members are urged to determine whether or not they are eligible to vote, to consider all the relevant information available, and to exercise their rights by voting next week.

- \* A Public Land Ownership Conference - a major working conference focussing on alternative viewpoints of public land ownership and its policy implications - is taking place on the York campus November 13 - 15, 1975. Sponsored by York University, with the cooperation of the Canadian Participation Secretariat for Habitat (the United Nations Conference on Human Settlements, Vancouver, June 1976), the Conference will explore such themes as: political implications; design of implementation procedures; and the long term impacts of public land ownership. Professor Neal Roberts, property and land use lawyer at Osgoode Hall Law School, is Chairman of the Conference. Information on Conference registration may be obtained from the Conference Chairman, or from the Conference Coordinator, Ann Montgomery (telephone local -3981).
- \* Members of the University community are invited to attend the Fall Convocation ceremony to be held on Friday, November 7 at 8:00 p.m. in the Main Gymnasium of the Tait McKenzie Building. Degrees will be awarded to approximately 500 graduands from the Faculties of Administrative Studies, Arts, Environmental Studies, Fine Arts, Graduate Studies, Law, Science and Glendon College. Dr. Mortimer Appley, President of Clark University and founding Chairman of York's Psychology Department, will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Science and will deliver the Convocation Address.
- \* A limited supply of application forms for the 1976-77 Ontario Graduate Scholarship Program are available from either S802 or N923 of the Ross Building. This scholarship is open to students having a high level of academic achievement, with first-class standing in most cases. Holders of student visas are not eligible to apply for this award unless they held the award in 1975-76. Completed application forms should be submitted to the Faculty of Graduate Studies, Room N923, no later than December 1, 1975.
- \* Winters College is presenting their annual "Big Band" dance on Saturday, November 8 at 9:00 p.m. in the College Dining Hall. Tickets are \$6.00 each and will be available from Rooms 269, 272, 273, 275 in Winters College. All proceeds will go to the Residence Furniture Fund and all members of the community are welcome.
- \*  The Canadian Red Cross Transfusion Service - a partner of United Way delivered 120,000 units of whole blood to Metro Toronto in 1974. The Canadian Red Cross provides blood at no charge to anyone who requires blood. The quality of blood is far superior to that obtained from commercial blood collection agencies which operate in a number of other countries including parts of the United States. "Thanks to you - it's working the United Way."
- \* A television interview on the CFTO-TV program "Toronto Today" with Don Rubin, Associate Professor in York's Faculty of Fine Arts and editor of the Canadian Theatre Review, will take place on Wednesday, November 5 at 8:30 a.m. The topic of discussion will be the newly-released CTR Yearbook, which was published by York University. The Yearbook is the first attempt at documenting a given year in the Canadian professional theatre and contains material on some 70 professional theatres in Canada and features, on a province by province basis, complete documentation on every play produced in Canada in 1974.
- \* On Tuesday, November 11, Donald Coles, Associate Professor of Humanities at York, will give a poetry reading between 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. in the Senior Common Room of Vanier College. Professor Coles has recently published a book of his poetry entitled Sometimes All Over.
- \* An unspecified number of University Scholarships are offered by the Government of France as part of the Cultural Agreement France-Canada. The scholarships are available for one academic year of study for the master's degree or two to three years for a Ph.D. thesis. This competition is open to Canadian citizens, or those who have held landed immigrant status for at least one year prior to submitting application. Candidates must have obtained an honours bachelor's degree and an excellent knowledge of French is essential; candidates who are more than 35 years of age are not eligible. Deadline for submission of applications is December 15, 1975, and application forms may be obtained from the Awards Officer, International Programs, A.U.C.C., 151 Slater Street, Ottawa K1P 5N1.
- \* There will be a Food Services Committee Meeting on Monday, November 3 at 4:00 p.m. in Room 218, Bethune College.

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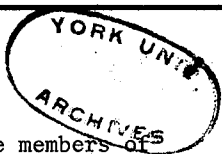
