## GENERAL

- \* Status of Y.U.S.A.'s Application for Certification - Staff turned out in large numbers over the three days voting period last week and voted heavily in favour of Y.U.S.A. being certified by the Ontario Labour Relations Board as the Union to represent "employees performing office, clerical, laboratory or technical work". Approximately 80% of the eligible persons cast ballots and the results indicated 599 persons said Yes, 158 persons said No. The Ontario Labour Relations Board must now give its final decision as to exactly who is in the bargaining unit - there are still 50 positions that must be determined as being in or out of the unit - and will presumably formally certify Y.U.S.A. as the exclusive bargaining agent in the next little while. Negotiations can then start to arrive at a formal Collective Agreement that will govern working arrangements between the University and members of Y.U.S.A.
- \* The colour film "Tamara" will be shown at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, November 12 in the Stong College Theatre, Room 112. Directed and produced by Tadeusz Jaworski, the film presents close-up shots of Tamara Jaworska's tapestries and her commentary about the relationship of her work to her sources of inspiration. Mrs. Jaworska's award-winning tapestries have been exhibited in her native Poland, Cologne, Vienna, Edinburgh, England, Scotland, Leningrad, Teheran, Montreal, and Toronto. Currently several of her tapestries are hanging at The First Canadian Place, Bank Tower in Toronto and in the headquarters of Bell Canada in Ottawa.
