University Closing Due to Extreme Weather Conditions: The approach of winter calls for the annual notice of policy with regard to closing the University when extreme weather makes road conditions hazardous. As a large community with academic schedules to meet and many members to serve, the importance of avoiding disruption is evident. There are times, however, when public safety indicates temporary interruption of the regular routines of the University. Hopefully, such occasions will be rare. The information given below is provided for the guidance of York members. It should be noted that, because a storm may coincide with special events such as examinations, visits by distinguished guests, and special meetings which would be particularly difficult to reschedule, it is not the intention of this policy to require the cancellation of such events. Whether or not they are cancelled is at the discretion of those directly responsible. When severe weather conditions occur before the University opens in the morning, on the authority of the President and the Chairman of Senate, an announcement suspending classes and office attendance will be made on the following radio stations as soon after 7:00 a.m. as possible: CKEY (AM) (EMM (CM) (EPB (AM)) (CEP (AM)) CKEY (AM) CHUM (AM) CFRB (AM) CBL (AM) CKFM (FM)

Radio York will also carry the same message after 8:00 a.m. When severe weather conditions occur, or are reported as imminent by the meteorological services of the Provincial Government, after the University has opened for the day, on the authority of the President and the Chairman of Senate, the Office of the Vice-President (Administration) will notify the head of each major division and administrative department that the University will be closed from a specific time that day. The person so informed will then be responsible for passing on the message to everyone in his unit. Announcement will also be made over Radio York. Labour Board Decision - Y.U.S.A. Bargaining Unit

A decision of the Labour Relations Board dated December 10, 1975, defines the Y.U.S.A. bargaining unit as follows:

> All employees of York University in Metropolitan Toronto at York Campus and Glendon College performing office, clerical, laboratory or technical work, save and except supervisors, persons above the rank of supervisor, all academic appointees of the University including faculty, teaching staff and graduate students, all persons employed in a professional capacity including those employed in the fields of engineering, accounting, library science, medicine and nursing, all persons employed in student counselling in the classifications of counsellor, senior counsellor, counselling officer--faculty of graduate studies, student advisor, program supervisor, project supervisor and project associate, all persons paid from other than Operating or Ancillary funds, all persons employed in the Department of Personnel Services and all persons employed outside of the department in the classifications of personnel co-ordinator, office manager-personnel assistant and director of accounts and personnel, all persons employed in the offices of the president, vice-presidents and assistant vice-presidents; employees employed in the offices of the Secretary of the University, and Director of financial planning in the classification of Assistant, all assistants and administrative assistants to deans and directors, all confidential programmers at the level of P3 or above employed in the department of management information systems, all students employed during the school vacation period, all persons regularly employed for not more than 24 hours per week, all employees covered by subsisting collective agreements.
