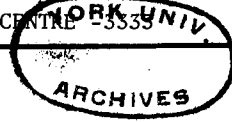

COMMISSION ON GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The Commission on Goals and Objectives, established to identify the University's future goals and objectives and to articulate York's immediate and short-term areas of priority, is presently gathering information on the academic and administrative functions of the University. The Commission has formally requested written Briefs from the academic units of the York and, as part of this process, would also appreciate written submissions from members of the support staff. Although you may wish to base a submission on a particular issue within your area of responsibility that could affect the future goals and priorities of the University, the Commission would be particularly interested in your views on the following questions: (i) how well, in your opinion, has York developed as a community in recent years? (ii) what are the present strengths and weaknesses of York, as a place of learning, culture and recreation? (iii) what do you perceive is the external assessment of York and what steps need to be taken to improve our image and role in the external community? (iv) what additional factors, affecting the learning environment of York, should be considered by the Commission in identifying the University's future goals and objectives?

The length of the Brief is optional, although no submission need be longer than 5,000 words. In addition, staff members may wish to combine to submit a collective Brief to the Commission, on a particular area of interest, or in response to the suggested questions. In order that the Commission can obtain the views of the support staff on these issues as early as possible in its deliberations, all communications should be submitted by Wednesday, March 3, 1976.

The length of the Brief is optional, although no submission need be longer than 5,000 words. In addition, staff members may wish to combine to submit a collective Brief to the Commission, on a particular area of interest, or in response to the suggested questions. In order that the Commission can obtain the views of the support staff on these issues as early as possible in its deliberations, all communications should be submitted by Wednesday, March 3, 1976.

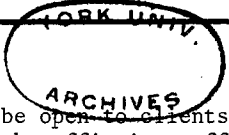

PLEASE BE SURE TO NOTIFY YOUR OFFICE OF STUDENT PROGRAMMES (OR, IN THE CASE OF GRADUATE STUDENTS, THE GRADUATE RECORDS OFFICE) IMMEDIATELY OF ANY CHANGE IN YOUR PERMANENT ADDRESS.

2. NAME CHANGE
