The York University Staff Association and the University have reached agreement on the first contract to be signed by the two parties. The agreement was ratified by the Staff Association (by 93% of the voting members) at a special meeting yesterday. Copies of the full agreement, when printed, will be available from the Office of Personnel Services. Following are some of the highlights of the contract:

- 1) **Term:** The contract runs for 12 months from September 2, 1976.
- 2) **Wages:** An increase of 10 per cent or \$950, whichever is greater, retroactive to July 1, 1976. Every effort will be made to implement this increase as soon as possible. It is expected that the retroactive pay and the new rate of pay will appear on the October 25 payroll.
- 3) **Insured Benefits:** The University will contribute 75 per cent of Ontario Hospitalization Insurance Program premiums; 100 per cent of Extended Health Care premiums; 50 per cent of Group Life Insurance premiums; 50 per cent of Long Term Disability Insurance premiums.
- 4) **Leaves:**
 - a) **Maternity Leave:** Up to 17 weeks maternity leave will be granted, during which time the University will continue its contribution to the insured benefits package. At the end of the leave, the employee will be reinstated in her previous position;
 - b) **Paternity Leave:** Three days paid leave;
 - c) **Adoption Leave:** Three days paid leave;
 - d) **Bereavement Leave:** Three days paid leave upon the death of any member of the employee's immediate family;
 - e) **Personal Leave:** Three days paid leave for personal reasons;
 - f) **Sick Leave:** Sick leave accrues at a rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ days per month, to a maximum of 115 days;
 - g) **Leaves of Absence:** Up to three months leave of absence may be granted, during which time the University will continue its contribution to the insured benefits package and the employee will continue to accrue seniority. At the end of the leave the employee will be reinstated in his or her former position;
 - h) **Jury Leave:** Leaves required for jury duty will be paid.
- 5) **Grievance Procedure:** A formalized procedure which provides for settlement by arbitration if the dispute cannot be settled between the University and the Staff Association.
- 6) **Management Functions:** The management functions clause defines the rights and duties of management. Rights not restricted by the terms of the contract are deemed to be those of management.
- 7) **Vacation and Holidays:** There will be 10 paid holidays (statutory holidays), with an additional two days between Christmas and New Year's to provide for the Christmas Break.
Paid vacation will accrue at the following rate: one day per month up to 10 months' service; two weeks after one year's service; three weeks after two years' service; four weeks after eight years' service. This calculation will be based on the individual employee's anniversary date, rather than on the July 1 to June 30 vacation year.
- 8) **Union Security:** All members of the union at the time of ratification shall continue to be members and to pay dues. Employees hired after the ratification date may or may not become members of the union, but must pay dues in either case. Employees who were not members of the union at the time of ratification will be deemed to be members unless they revoke membership within 30 days of ratification. An employee who revokes membership in the union shall contribute monthly an amount equal to union dues to the York Child Care Centre.

The York University Staff Association and the University have reached agreement on the first contract to be signed by the two parties. 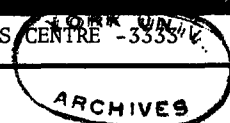
- 1) **Term:** The contract runs for 12 months from September 2, 1976.
- 2) **Wages:** An increase of 10 per cent or \$950, whichever is greater, retroactive to July 1, 1976. Every effort will be made to implement this increase as soon as possible. It is expected that the retroactive pay and the new rate of pay will appear on the October 25 payroll.
- 3) **Insured Benefits:** The University will contribute 75 per cent of Ontario Hospitalization Insurance Program premiums; 100 per cent of Extended Health Care premiums; 50 per cent of Group Life Insurance premiums; 50 per cent of Long Term Disability Insurance premiums.
- 4) **Leaves:**
 - a) **Maternity Leave:** Up to 17 weeks maternity leave will be granted, during which time the University will continue its contribution to the insured benefits package. At the end of the leave, the employee will be reinstated in her previous position;
 - b) **Paternity Leave:** Three days paid leave;
 - c) **Adoption Leave:** Three days paid leave;
 - d) **Bereavement Leave:** Three days paid leave upon the death of any member of the employee's immediate family;
 - e) **Personal Leave:** Three days paid leave for personal reasons;
 - f) **Sick Leave:** Sick leave accrues at a rate of 1½ days per month, to a maximum of 115 days;
 - g) **Leaves of Absence:** Up to three months leave of absence may be granted, during which time the University will continue its contribution to the insured benefits package and the employee will continue to accrue seniority. At the end of the leave the employee will be reinstated in his or her former position;
 - h) **Jury Leave:** Leaves required for jury duty will be paid.
- 5) **Grievance Procedure:** A formalized procedure which provides for settlement by arbitration if the dispute cannot be settled between the University and the Staff Association.
- 6) **Management Functions:** The management functions clause defines the rights and duties of management. Rights not restricted by the terms of the contract are deemed to be those of management.
- 7) **Vacation and Holidays:** There will be 10 paid holidays (statutory holidays), with an additional two days between Christmas and New Year's to provide for the Christmas Break.

GENERAL

- * Members of the York community are asked to note that the SUMMER INTERCHANGE section of the York Bulletin will be discontinued as of the week of September 20.
- * YORK TELEPHONE DIRECTORY: The 1976-77 York Telephone Directory will be issued by November 1, 1976. The cut-off date for any additions, deletions or changes will be September 10, 1976. This year's book will be a revision of the 1975-76 directory. Additions, deletions and changes must be submitted on a "Change of Listing" form to the Telecommunications Office, Room C5 of the Temporary Office Building; forms may be obtained by calling -2337 (please note that one form is required per listing). Special care must be taken when submitting listings for faculty who are cross-appointed; in these cases it may be advisable to liaise with the other department or college concerned. If changes have occurred in the "Departmental Listing", the department is required to submit on a separately typed sheet the complete Departmental Listing as it is to appear in the new directory. If there are no changes, simply send a memo to that effect before the cut-off date. When submitting the new Departmental Listing (or no change memo) departments should also advise Telecommunications of the number of York Directory inserts required.
- * Parking Notice: In order to give new members of the community the opportunity to purchase parking decals, vehicles may park free of charge in any peripheral (single letter) lot on the York Campus - except "M" lot - until September 24, 1976. All motor vehicles driven on campus must be registered with the Parking Office, Temporary Office Building, by the above date. Persons registering vehicles are advised that they must be prepared to provide the ownership permit. Registration may be effected by purchasing a Day-time Reserved Area Decal (\$100), a Day-time Unreserved Decal (\$35), an Evening Reserved Area Decal (\$35), an Evening Unreserved Area Decal (\$7.50), or by obtaining a Registration Decal which is issued free of charge. Sessional Evening Area Decals are available only to part-time personnel who will be required to produce evidence of their part-time status. Those persons obtaining a Registration are required to pay a daily fee of 75¢ and are permitted to park in "M" lot only.
- * The Council of the York Student Federation requires individuals to administer an on-campus survey during registration, September 8-10, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Salary is \$2.65 per hour; interested persons should apply to the C.Y.S.F. Office, Room 105, Central Square.
- * Reorganization-Ancillary Services: Effective September 1, 1976, the financial management aspects of Ancillary Services operating branches (ie. Conferences, Food and Beverage Services, and Residences) will be concentrated in a new Finance Office with Mr. D. Nesbitt (local -3771) as Manager. Mrs. J. 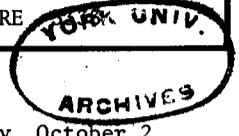
