

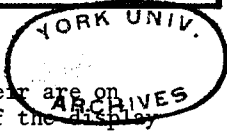

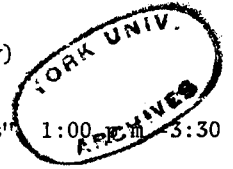

Several alternative proposals have come forward from the membership since that time and the purpose of this meeting is to discuss these alternatives. At the York campus, the meeting is at 10:00 a.m. in the Vanier College Senior Common Room; at the Glendon campus, the meeting is at 1:00 p.m. in the Fireside Room, York Hall. Both meetings will take place today.
- \* The Faculty of Arts is presenting the Edgar McInnis Lectures with guest speaker John Porter, Canadian sociologist and author, on February 1 and 2 in the Moot Court Room of the Osgoode Hall Law School. The general theme of the two part lecture series will be "Equality, Opportunity and Education: A Reassessment". Dr. McInnis died in 1973.

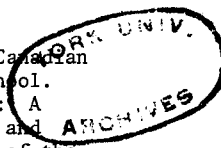
