Anderson, Director of Adolescent Services at Chedoke hospitals and Professor of Anatomy and Psychiatry at McMaster University, will deliver the first lecture on Tuesday, March 8. The second lecture, scheduled for Tuesday, March 15, will feature Martin W. Goodman, editor-in-chief of the Toronto Star and director of the Star's board of directors. Canadian geologist J. Tuzo Wilson, Director-General of the Ontario Science Centre, former Principal of Erindale College, University of Toronto, and distinguished lecturer at the University of Toronto, will speak on Tuesday, March 22. The final lecture in the series will be delivered by Peter Charles Swann on Tuesday, March 29. Mr. Swann is the Executive Director of the Samuel and Saidye Bronfman Foundation, and he is the former Director of the Royal Ontario Museum. Each lecture will be held at 4:30 p.m. in the Moot Court Room of the Osgoode Hall Law School and all interested members of the community are invited to attend.
