A.I.B. AND THE Y.U.S.A. AGREEMENT

On March 16, 1977, the University was advised that the Anti-Inflation Board had reviewed the compensation increases set out in the University/Y.U.S.A. Collective Agreement, and had judged these increases to be larger than acceptable under the Anti-Inflation Programme. The negotiated compensation increases, along with those changes to terms and conditions of employment equated by A.I.B. to compensation, totalled 10.94% when expressed in the A.I.B. definitions and reporting formats. The A.I.B. decision was that, in its view, a maximum of 8% was allowable.

University representatives immediately arranged to go to Ottawa to discuss and seek clarification of the Board's reasons for arriving at its decision. This meeting, which took place on March 22, 1977, also involved discussion of the applicability of various Technical Bulletin decisions the A.I.B. had issued since the University's submission last October. It was decided that the University would seek permission for a re-submission to A.I.B., revised in the light of these Technical Bulletins (Following the University's meeting, members of Y.U.S.A.'s executive met with Mr. Guest, of A.I.B.'s Compensation Branch, and have confirmed the University's impression that there is strong possibility of A.I.B. granting a review in our case.).

Subsequently, the University, in association with Y.U.S.A., has written to the Director of the Public Administration Division of the A.I.B., advising that the University is submitting the necessary forms for further consideration, and that the revised figures are being developed accordingly. The University has also requested that, pending re-examination, it be exempted from any requirement to implement the A.I.B. decision to roll back increases and recover any previous payments in excess of the A.I.B.-approved figures. Consequently, as of this date the University has planned no action to either reduce salary levels or deduct any "over payment" of previous earnings.

The University wants to see the Agreement maintained, consequently, it is our hope that the A.I.B. will reconsider its decision in order that alterations in the terms of the existing Agreement would be unnecessary.

Other $\underline{\text{Bulletins}}$ will report on this matter as further concrete information becomes available.


