The Commission hopes that all those who are interested will take advantage of this opportunity to understand the reasoning behind its conclusions, which were reached after fifteen months of intensive work analyzing York's shortcomings and opportunities as presented by members of the University community.

A.I.B. and the Y.U.S.A. Agreement

An announcement in the York Bulletin of April 7, 1977, advised the York Community that the compensation agreement between the University and Y.U.S.A. was unacceptable to A.I.B., and that the University had written to the Director of the Public Administration Division of A.I.B. advising him of York's intention

written to the Director of the Public Administration Division of A.I.B. advising him of York's intention to seek further consideration of the A.I.B. decision.

The solution proposed to A.I.B. by the University and Y.U.S.A. was that last fall's agreement on retroactivity of salary adjustments should be amended, so that retroactivity extended back only to August 1, 1976, rather than July 1, 1976. A.I.B. has agreed to this proposal. Thus existing salary ranges and individual salaries need not be changed, but A.I.B. has ruled that "all current members of the bargaining unit who received retroactive pay for the month of July, 1976 will be required to return such monies to the University."

The representatives of the University and Y.U.S.A. feel that this is a few more forwardle response from

The representatives of the University and Y.U.S.A. feel that this is a far more favourable response from A.I.B., and accept the stipulation on retroactivity payments as a necessary part of winning A.I.B.'s approval not to roll back individual salary rates. The University and Y.U.S.A. have agreed to meet to work out the specific method of repayment in order to report back to A.I.B. This meeting will take place shortly; the outcome will be communicated to the individuals affected as soon as possible.

A.I.B. and the Y.U.S.A. Exempt Group

The University was recently advised by the A.I.B. that salary increments for the "Y.U.S.A.-exempt" group were deemed to be in excess of the A.I.B. guidelines, a decision consistent with A.I.B.'s first decision on Y.U.S.A. increments. The University immediately sought a delay in implementation of the roll back order, pending A.I.B.'s decision on the Y.U.S.A. resubmission. Now that a favourable response to that resubmission has been received, we are hoping for a parallel reconsideration of the decision on the Y.U.S.A.-exempt, and will communicate with the York Community as soon as further word from A.I.B. is received.
