- * The Faculty of Arts is presenting The Edgar McInnis Lectures with guest speaker, the Honourable Walter L. Gordon, on October 12 and 13 at 3:00 p.m. in the Moot Court Room of Osgoode Hall Law School. The general theme of the two-part lecture series will be "What is Happening to Canada". On Wednesday, October 12, Mr. Gordon will speak on "What Has Happened in the Last Twenty Years" and on Thursday, October 13, the topic of the lecture will be "Our Basic Problems and Some Suggestions for Dealing with Them". The Edgar McInnis Lectures were inaugurated in 1976 and are named in honour of the late Edgar W. McInnis who was the first appointment to the academic staff at York University in 1960. He served as Professor and Chairman of the Department of History (1960-63, 1966-69), Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies (1963-66), was appointed York's first University Orator in 1968 and became Professor Emeritus in 1970. Dr. McInnis died in 1973.
- * The Music Department, Stong and Calumet Colleges, are sponsoring a Festival of Native Arts from Thursday, October 13 through to Friday, October 28.
