- * NOTICE TO SUPPORT STAFF: The A.I.B. paybacks with respect to the 1976-77 Y.U.S.A. compensation agreement was not deducted from the December pay of Y.U.S.A. Bargaining Unit members as originally scheduled. The deductions will be taken from the January and February 1978 pay cheques. The paybacks for the Y.U.S.A. Exempt Group will be carried out as originally scheduled with the deductions being taken from the December 1977 and January 1978 pay cheques.
The 1977-78 compensation agreement between Y.U.S.A. and the University has been implemented and the increase was reflected on the December 21st, 1977 salary cheque.

GENERAL

- * The Spadina Subway line is scheduled to open on Saturday, January 28th. Among the numerous changes and innovations in the TTC bus lines associated with the new subway stations, two are of particular interest to York. The first is a completely new TTC service, "York University 106", which will provide a direct link between the York campus and Wilson Station, the northern terminus of the Spadina Subway. The map and timetable, printed on the back page of the Bulletin, show the main features of the service. It should be noted that it is not necessary to change trains at St. George in order to reach stations on the Yonge Subway since the Spadina Subway is merely a northerly extension of the Finch-St. George, Yonge-University line, with all trains running between Wilson Heights and Finch via the loop at Union Station, with interchanges to the Bloor-Danforth line at St. George and Bloor stations. York University 106 enters the south campus on Sentinel Drive and follows the campus ring-road (Fraser Drive) clockwise to the Ross ramp with stops at Niagara and Fraser; Stong/Bethune; Tait McKenzie; the Temporary Office Building; north of Complex #1; Winters College; and the Ross Building. The bus leaves the campus by Fraser Drive with a final stop on campus at Niagara/Fraser before travelling south on Sentinel Drive.
 The second change affecting York involves modifications to the Keele Street service. In order to provide the York University 106 service, and to provide service (for the first time) to the industrial area on the east side of Keele Street, there will now be a basic 20 minute frequency for Keele buses coming onto the campus, and all Keele buses entering the campus will enter by St. Lawrence Boulevard. The current practice of off-peak buses entering through the south campus will be discontinued.

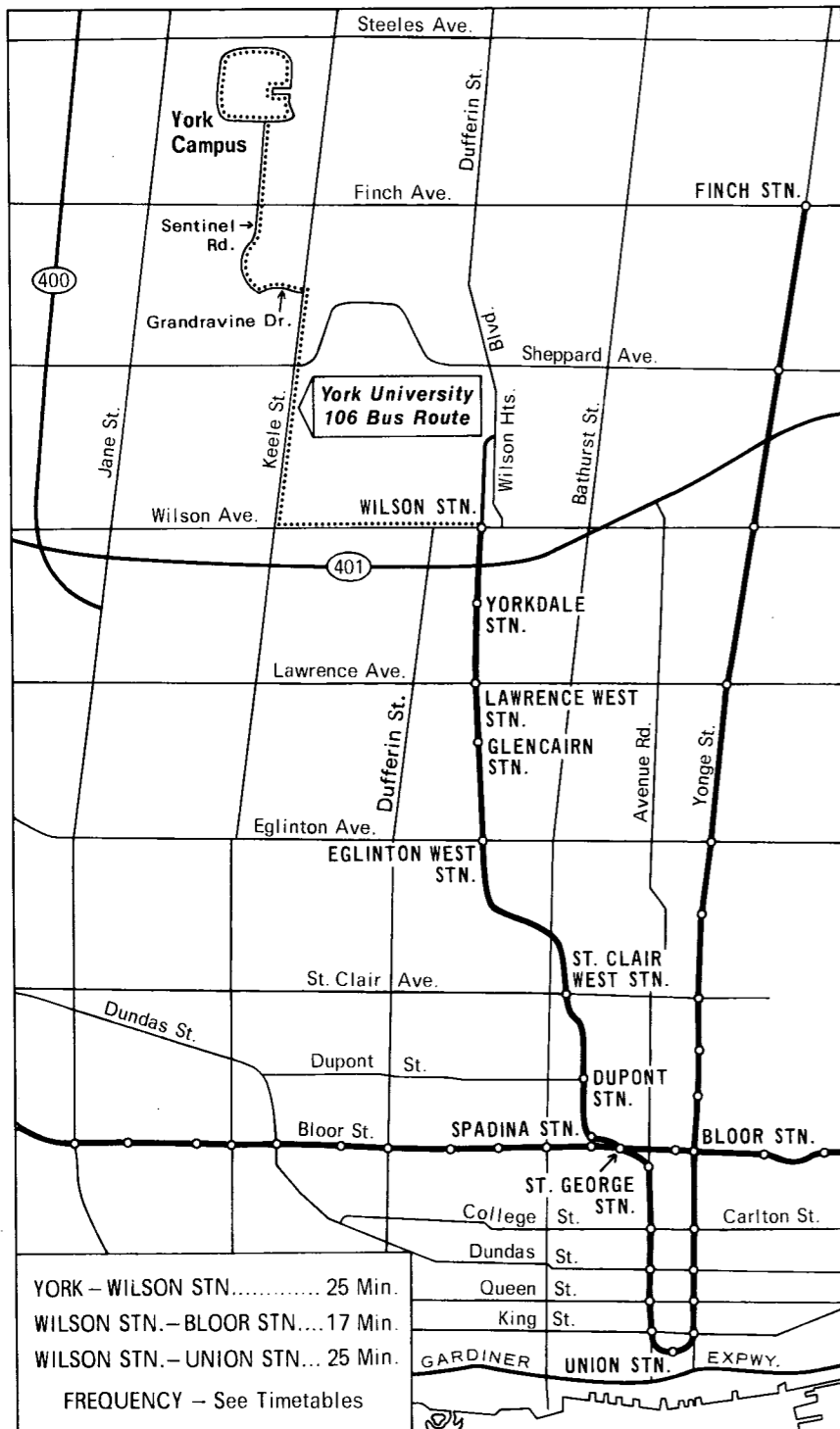

York University 106 enters the south campus on Sentinel Drive and follows the campus ring-road (Fraser Drive) clockwise to the Ross ramp with stops at Niagara and Fraser; Stong/Bethune; Tait McKenzie; the Temporary Office Building; north of Complex #1; Winters College; and the Ross Building. The bus leaves the campus by Fraser Drive with a final stop on campus at Niagara/Fraser before travelling south on Sentinel Drive. The second change affecting York involves modifications to the Keele Street service. In order to provide the York University 106 service, and to provide service (for the first time) to the industrial area on the east side of Keele Street, there will now be a basic 20 minute frequency for Keele buses coming onto the campus, and all Keele buses entering the campus will enter by St. Lawrence Boulevard. The current practice of off-peak buses entering through the south campus will be discontinued. 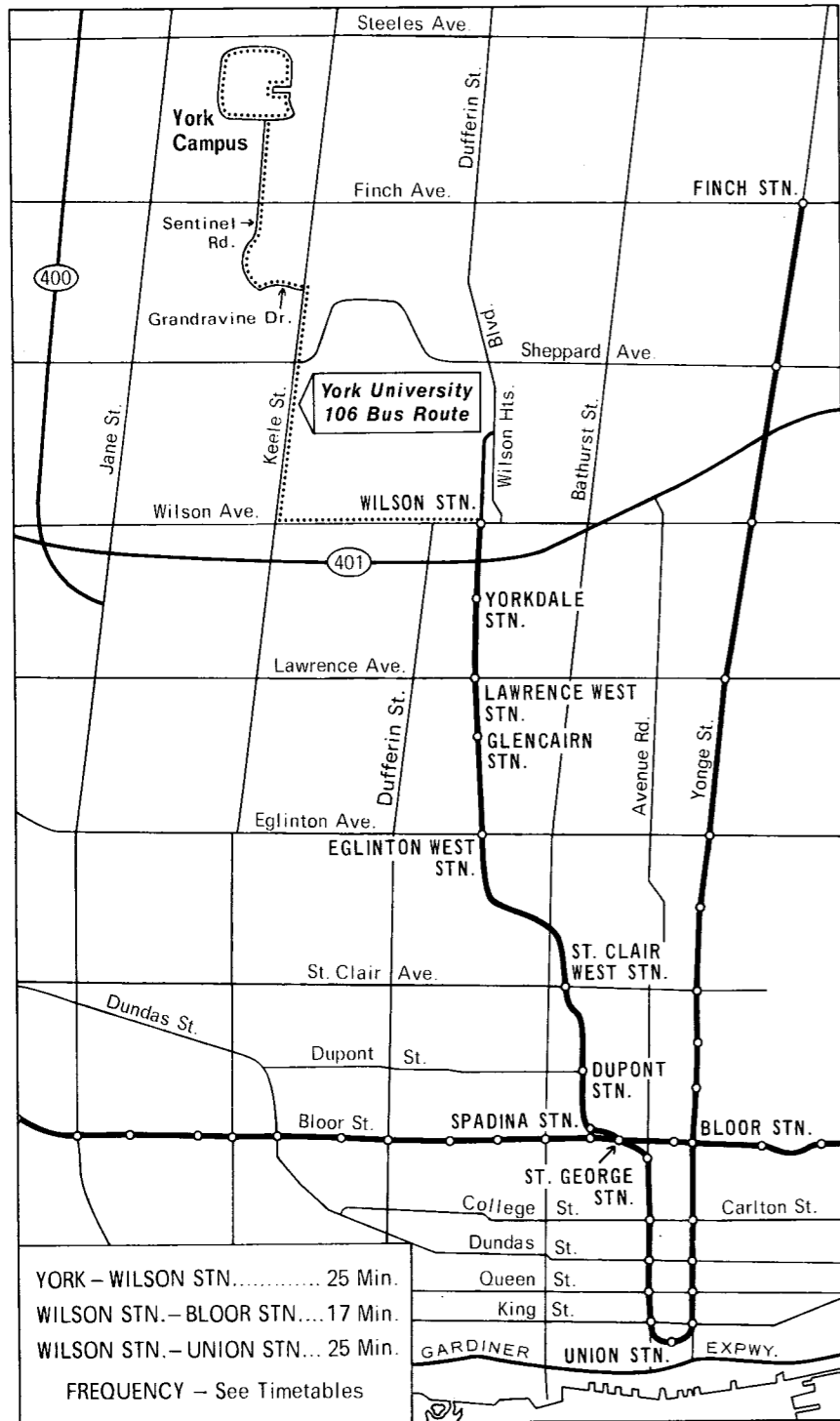
