ATTENTION: GRADUATING STUDENTS

The schedule of 1978 Spring Convocation ceremonies appears below. Students planning to graduate this Spring should note the following information.

1. You should consult your Faculty Calendar if you are in doubt about the academic requirements for graduation. Any enquiries about eligibility should be directed to the appropriate Faculty's Office of Student Programmes (O.S.P.), or the Graduate Records Office if you are a graduate student.
2. If you are graduating from the Faculty of Arts, Fine Arts, Glendon College, Graduate Studies, Education or Law, your name is added automatically to the graduation list and you will be sent an invitation in May. Invitations are mailed by the College Master's Office (for students in the Faculty of Arts) and by the Student Programmes Office (for all other students).
3. If you are graduating from the Faculty of Administrative Studies, Science, or Atkinson College, you must indicate your intention to graduate before an invitation is mailed. Consult your Calendar or O.S.P. for details.
4. If you are registered in an Honours (4-year) Programme but wish to graduate at the end of the third year (i.e., fifteen credits), you must apply for this transfer by a specified deadline. Consult your Calendar or O.S.P.
5. Your name will appear on both the diploma and the Convocation programme in the same form that it appears on your Study List. You should notify the Office of Student Programmes (or the Graduate Record Office) if you wish to change the recorded version of your name. Such a change should be registered as soon as possible.
6. By resolution of the University Senate, degrees shall be withheld from otherwise-eligible students who owe (a) outstanding tuition fees, (b) outstanding library fines, and/or (c) overdue library books beyond a period of sixty days.

- * The Telecommunications Office announces Bell Canada's "Zero plus" program aimed at providing faster service on person-to-person, collect, credit card and third-number-billing long distance calls. On each of these operator-assisted calls the caller not the operator is now required to dial the distant number.
The new dialing instructions are contained in a special brochure, and on a plastic telephone-mounting clip which have already been distributed to all departments on campus. The basic steps to follow on operator-assisted calls, effective immediately are:
 - dial "9" followed by "0"
 - dial the area code (if it's not 416)
 - dial the remaining seven digits of the distant number
 - when the operator comes on the line at the end of dialing advise whether the call is to be person-to-person, collect or third number and provide any other details requested. Under this new system, the operator has a visual display of the number being called from as well as the number being dialed.
 It should be noted that operator-assisted rates will apply to such calls, and all faculty and staff are therefore requested to use the direct distance dialing network rather than operator-assistance whenever possible (dial 9, then 1, the area code if not 416 then the complete seven-digit number). This is still the fastest and cheapest way to call long distance.
This new service is available only in Toronto, so far. Bell Canada is considering introducing the service in other Ontario and Quebec locations sometime in the future.
Concurrent with the above Bell system change it is also possible now to dial overseas calls with or without the assistance of an operator. Full details are contained in another Bell brochure, supplies of which have been distributed to departmental administrative assistants.
