#### **GENERAL**

Members of the York community should note that the buses operated by York University will continue to adhere to their regular schedules during the TTC strike (copies are available from Information York Booth and the Bookstores). The buses will pick up members of the community enroute to the University. To facilitate hitchhiking (whether on these buses or by car), York identification signs are now available from the Information York Booth; these will identify community members seeking a ride to campus (or may be displayed in the cars of those who drive to campus) and should be used to flag down the York buses. C.Y.S.F. has established a Ride Board which is located outside their office in Central Square. A grid system is in the process of being established, but for the time being members of the community requiring a ride and drivers willing to take passengers may sign up at the Ride Board.

- \* In order to give new members of the community the opportunity to purchase parking decals. vehicles may park free of charge in any peripheral (single letter) lot on the York campus until September 22, 1978. All motor vehicles driven on campus must be registered with the Parking Office (Temporary Office Building) by the above date; persons registering vehicles are advised that they must be prepared to provide the ownership permit. Registration may be effected by purchasing a Day-time Reserved Area Decal (\$125/year), a Day-time Unreserved Area Decal (\$40/year), an Evening Reserved Decal (valid after 5:00 p.m. only; \$20/session), an Evening Unreserved Decal (valid after 5:00 p.m. only; \$10/session), or by obtaining a Registration Decal, which is issued free of charge. Sessional Evening Area Decals are available only to part-time personnel, who will be required to produce evidence of their part-time status. Those persons obtaining a Registration Decal are required to pay the appropriate fee in lots where hourly or daily fees are accepted. After September 22, attendants will be on duty at all peripheral lots and those persons without appropriate current decals will be required to park in "M" lot and to pay the daily fee of \$1.00. Motorcycle parking fees are \$2.00 per year.

# UNIVERSITY STATEMENT ON Y.U.S.A. NEGOTIATIONS

Contract negotiations between the University and Y.U.S.A. are scheduled to resume today, Friday, September 15, 1978, utilizing the mediation services of the Ministry of Labour. If those negotiations fail to result in an agreement, Y.U.S.A. will be in a position to strike legally at any time.

The University has been advised by Y.U.S.A. that a report on the weekend's negotiations will be presented to the union membership on Monday, September 18th, and that Tuesday, September 19th would be the earliest date contemplated for strike action by Y.U.S.A. if no agreement has been reached.

### Unresolved Issues

There are several issues remaining unresolved in negotiations. The major non-monetary items are Y.U.S.A.'s demands for contract clauses which would:

- (a) prohibit the University from contracting out any work of the kind performed by bargaining unit members;
- (b) prohibit supervisors and managerial personnel from performing work of the kind performed by bargaining unit members; and,
- (c) allow Y.U.S.A.-unit members to honour picket lines of other campus unions without penalty.

The University's position has been, and continues to be, that these clauses would produce far too great a restriction on the University's operating flexibility.

There is a large gap between the union's monetary demands and the University's offer. Y.U.S.A. negotiators are asking for salary increments costing approximately 10.3% and fringe benefits changes which amount to a further .6%. The University's offer is for a total increment of 4%, concentrated on salaries rather than benefits.

## Basis of the University's Position

In the preparation of budgets for 1978-79, York faced a serious revenue/expenditures squeeze. The government announced that it would increase per-student grants at a rate far below the rate of cost inflation. Government grants and tuition fees would suffer further from the enrolment decline experienced in 1977-78 and a further decline projected for 1978-79. This further decline, of approximately 3% in overall full-time equivalent student enrolment, has in fact occurred, despite encouraging growth in the first year in some Faculties.

York's sober revenue forecasts for 1978-79 are, therefore, turning out to be valid. In order to meet rising costs and maintain the viability of programs and services, the University engaged in a major budget-cutting operation last winter and spring, cutting 1977-78 base budgets back by some \$3.8 million. The main "rising cost" is the University's salary bill; a decision was made to create a pool of funds sufficient to provide increments of 4% to the University's employees on their various increment dates. Very serious cuts had to be made to create a pool of even that size. A larger pool would have required even more drastic cuts and loss of jobs. Income projections for 1979-80 are no more encouraging.

# Increments and Offers to Other Employee Groups

The University has held to its 1978-79 increments policy in decisions and negotiations this year. York and C.U.P.E. agreed upon increments of 4% for 1978-79; final increments of 4% have been implemented for P&M staff; offers of 4% have been made to the Graduate Assistants' Association and to Operating Engineers. The current offer to Y.U.F.A. is 3% for 1978-79.

# In the Event of a Y.U.S.A. Strike

In the event of strike action by Y.U.S.A., the University intends to continue to operate and maintain its services to employees, students and residents although some services may be at a reduced level. Every effort will be made to provide work for members of the Y.U.S.A. bargaining unit who elect to cross picket lines. Employees who report for work will be paid at their regular pay; persons not reporting to work will not be paid. No paid vacation, sick leave or other leaves will be paid for members of the Y.U.S.A. bargaining unit during the period of a strike, and the University has written to Y.U.S.A. regarding premium payments for the possible continuation of benefits coverage. Any salary overpayments will be recovered in subsequent pays.

Employees not in the Y.U.S.A. bargaining unit are expected to report for work as usual. Campus unions other than Y.U.S.A. have been informed that the University intends to continue operations if Y.U.S.A. strikes, and that it is assumed that Collective Agreements will be honoured.

# Picket Line Rights and Responsibilities

It is now well established in Ontario that forming a picket line during the time a Union is in a legal strike situation is not in itself illegal, nor is it illegal to communicate information or for a member of a picket line to use peaceful persuasion on an employee about to enter the premises picketed.

On the other hand, it is entirely legal for members of a striking bargaining unit to cross a picket line, and it <u>is</u> a legal offence for pickets to use force, threats, or threatening gestures to block access to premises, to conduct themselves in such a way as to constitute a nuisance at law or an unlawful assembly, to trespass, to interfere by force with employees who wish to work, or to use threats or moral pressure amounting to compulsion. Mass picketing which has the effect of preventing students or employees from entering the University or prevents free passage of cars, trucks or goods in or out, similarly constitutes illegal picketing. The University does not intend to allow any picketing on the campus itself, and will insist that it be limited to the periphery.

In summary then, pickets are legally permitted to do certain things. They may carry signs stating the nature of the dispute. They may ask you to honour their picket line but they have no right to threaten you either verbally or physically to enforce that request. They are supposed to keep moving and the Union is not allowed to place so many strikers in front of an entrance to the campus that free passage in and out by non-striking staff is prevented.

All reasonable steps must be taken to avoid violence or other incidents on the picket line; the University will arrange for police surveillance of the picket lines to the extent necessary. In the event that entrance to the campus is prevented, employees other than those in the Y.U.S.A. bargaining unit should inform their Supervisor or Department Head/Chairman by telephone that they are unable to report to work.

## YUSA STRIKE IMPLICATIONS

This communique is intended to keep the York University community informed of the status of services as a result of strike action initiated by the York University Staff Association on September 18, 1978.

As indicated in the <u>Special Bulletin</u> of Friday, September 15, 1978, "In the event of strike action by <u>YUSA</u>, the <u>University</u> intends to continue to operate and maintain services to employees, students and residents, although many services will be at a reduced level."

- Instructional Aid Resources: Glendon campus, no service; York campus no photographic, television or audio-visual production and no delivery of audio-visual equipment to classrooms; there will, however, be a limited free pick-up service available in the Ross Building (041D, Central Square) for faculty only.
- <u>Libraries</u>: all libraries will be closed to faculty and students with the exception of the Law Library and the Scott Library Reserve Section which will maintain very limited operations.
- <u>Comptroller:</u> most accounting services will be maintained but at very reduced levels; normal payroll schedules will be maintained.
- University Facilities: the Religious Centre will remain closed except for scheduled services; classrooms will remain open subject to the provision of normal security and cleaning. There will be no re-issue of individual room time tables but the master allocation boards will be kept updated and the departments involved informed by telephone.
- Registration and Student Status: requests for transcripts will be accepted but none will be issued except on an emergency basis; student record updates will continue normally.

## Ancillary Services:

- (a) Bookstores both York and Glendon bookstores will be closed until further notice.
- (b) Duplicating Central Duplicating and Copy Centre will be closed.
- (c) Food Services all food service outlets on both campuses will maintain their normal operations.
- <u>Computer Services and Computer Systems Development:</u> academic and administrative processing will continue with limitations.
- Safety and Security: the parking office will be open.

# Student Services:

- (a) Student Awards will be open for enquiries only.
- (b) all other student services will be maintained albeit some on a reduced basis.

# Mail:

- (a) Only first-class mail will be received and sorted by the University Post Office; departments should pick up and deliver first-class mail only coming from or entering the Federal Post Office system, at the Central University Mail Room. There will be no intra-campus pick up or delivery; therefore, departments should make their own arrangements for delivery of such mail.
- (b) The Federal sub-post office will be closed. Individuals requiring stamps, money orders, or wanting to register letters, should utilize off-campus Post Office facilities.
- (c) Mail between Glendon and York campuses will still be delivered.

- Telephone Services: all telephone users are requested to refrain from calling the University switchboard or the ESC for routine calls; it is anticipated that some delays will be experienced on incoming calls to the University switchboard. No Service Requests will be processed by the department for telephone changes or new installations.
- Stationery Stores: an embargo will be placed on the receipt and processing of stationery orders.
- Alterations: new Service Requests for alteration work will not be processed; current work in progress will be completed, if possible.
- Maintenance: all breakdown maintenance will receive priority attention by calling local -2401.
- Bus Service: it is expected that the University bus service will continue to operate on its published schedule.
- <u>Caretaking Service</u>: it is expected that the normal caretaking services will continue to be provided.
- <u>I.U.T.S.</u>: the Inter-University Transit System will operate on schedule.

#### STATEMENT ON STRIKE

Negotiations between the York University Staff Association and the University were resumed last Saturday under the supervision of a senior mediator assigned by the Ministry of Labour. During the weekend sessions as a result of new initiatives taken by the University agreement was reached on all contract clauses covering the "job security" issues which had been identified by YUSA as their major concerns:

- impact of layoffs
- technological change
- supervisors' performance of 'bargaining unit work'
- contracting out

YUSA had already accepted, the previous weekend, a University proposal concerning 'work of a personal nature'.

The University has, therefore, met YUSA's concerns in those areas which YUSA has said are of greatest concern to it.

YUSA has continued to insist, however, that nearly all of its other demands also be met. On the major issue of salary increments, YUSA reduced its demand from 10% to 9% or \$900. As a result of this attitude, the mediator was forced to adjourn negotiations.

In view of YUSA's change of position as to its main priorities, the University finds it necessary to publish this statement in response to a steady stream of publicity supporting YUSA and ignoring the financial realities facing the University. That publicity has included many seriously distorted claims which deserve correction if the York community is to have an accurate perspective on this labour dispute.

- \* It has been reported that York received a 5.8% increase in operating funds this year. That is not correct. The Ontario universities as a whole did receive an increase of 5.8% in grants. York's increase in total income from fees and grants is only 4.2%, because of decreases in tuition fee income and special grants.
- \* 1977-78 salary increments were for only part of the 1977-78 budget year. A large part of York's new income for 1978-79 had to be allocated to pick up the full year cost of salary increments already agreed to in 1977-78. Inflation created large cost increases in non-salary areas such as heating fuel and books.
- \* Enrolment at York is not up this year. A forecast was made that total enrolment would decline by about 3%. So far, this estimate appears to be accurate.
- \* The oft-repeated claims that "the University has the money" are simply not true, and the many, many members of the York community who participated in the extended budgeting process last year or have read York's recently published and <u>audited</u> financial statement know that to be the case. Full data with accompanying texts have been published in a variety of campus publications during the past months. It is difficult to understand how anyone who participated in last year's march on Queen's Park to protest severe financial cutbacks can believe that "there are pots of gold hidden around the University". Base budget cuts of \$3.8 million had to be made in order to provide salary increments of 4% plus corresponding adjustments to existing fringe benefits. To offer more would mean more program cuts, more positions lost, fewer services. Each 1% increment for all of York's employee groups costs \$515,000 in the 1978-79 budget year alone; additional full-year costs would have to be met in 1979-80. Cuts in programs and services necessary to produce even an additional 1% would be extremely damaging, even if possible at this time of year.
- \* The provincial government has not only reduced current financial support to universities, but has also made it clear that we should not expect improvement. The province has also made it clear that it will not underwrite University deficits.
- \* Funding for such facilities as the Tennis Complex and the Track and Field Project now under construction are provided by external sources. York provides only the land and a share of maintenance costs (which we recover through rentals).

It is important that the York community understand that the University budgeted 4% salary increments in order to maintain programs, services and jobs. Further salary increments cannot be entertained without further serious and continuing cuts.

York University regrets the serious inconveniences caused to all members of the community by this disruption of services. We are attempting to continue as many services as possible and while it would be inaccurate to suggest we are operating at normal levels most faculties report over 90 per cent of their classes are being taught by faculty and attended by students. We will attempt to resolve this strike as soon as possible and ensure our students that everything within our power will be done to see that any class time lost will be made up before the end of the academic year. But it is the opinion of the Board of Governors and the University Senior Policy Committee (which includes all Deans of Faculties) that to meet all YUSA demands, considering the ramifications for the University, would not be in the best interest of any member of our community.

The Ministry of Labour has invited the University and Y.U.S.A. to meetings with provincial mediator Jean Read to discuss the resumption of negotiations on the outstanding issues in the current labour dispute. The University has been prepared to participate in negotiations anytime and will be pleased to attend such a meeting scheduled for Friday morning.
