- Ontario Heart Foundation: The Ontario Heart Foundation offers research grant and fellowship Support to investigators engaged in cardiovascular and/or cerebrovascular research. Types of fellowship awards include: Research Fellowships, Senior Research Fellowships and Research Associateships. Deadline for all awards is October 1.
- Ontario Mental Health Foundation: The Ontario Mental Health Foundation makes project research grants for the support of research in the mental health field carried out under the auspices of institutions in the province of Ontario. While most of the grants provided by the Foundation are for studies carried out under the leadership of one investigator, the Foundation encourages team efforts, especially those of the following types: joint research carried out by two or more senior investigators; related investigations within a department, institute, hospital or university; an integrated group of inter-departmental or interdisciplinary investigations within an institution; and, coordinated studies by investigators in several cooperating institutions. The deadline for applications to the program is October 12.
- Aid to Artsists Program: The Canada Council, through its Aid to Artists Program, offers assistance to individual artists in all disciplines and specialities. The term "artist", for the purposes of the program, describes those whose professional activities are essential to the arts and applies, therefore, not only to creators and performers, but also to other individuals such as arts administrators and critics, for example. The program includes the following five major programs: (1) Arts Grants 'A' are provided for artists who have worked successfully for several years in their careers, have some notable accomplishments to their credit and are still active in their profession. (2) Arts Grants 'B' are offered to artists who have completed basic training and are recognized as professionals. (3) Short-Term Grants are intended to provide living expenses for artists for a maximum of three months, not necessarily consecutive, to enable them to work on a specific project. These grants cannot be used to complete part of a long-term project for which other grants are available. (4) Project Cost Grants are intended to cover the cost of goods and services necessary to the completion of a specific project. These grants do not provide a living allowance for the artists. (5) Travel Grants are given to enable artists to travel on occasions important to their professional careers. They cover travel but not living expenses. The deadlines for Arts Grants 'A' are as follows: October 15 for artists in the fields of architecture, creative writing, dance, film, multidisciplinary work and performance art, music, photography, theatre, video, visual arts; April I for artists in the fields of creative writing and visual arts only. The deadlines for Arts Grants 'B' are as follows: October 15 for artists in the fields of architecture, creative writing, dance, film, multidisciplinary work and performance art, music (except singers and instrumentalists in "classical" music), photography, theatre, video, visual arts; December 15 for artists in the fields of architecture, creative writing, dance, film, multidisciplinary work and performance art, photography, theatre, video, visual arts. Applications for Short-Term, Project Cost or Travel Grants may be submitted at any time. There is usually a two month waiting period before notification of results. summer projects, the delay is often three months or more because of the large number of applications. Applicants must be Canadian citizens or landed immigrants. Landed immigrants who have not applied for Canadian citizenship are entitled to only one grant for which they must apply within the first three years after they acquire this status. The Council may waive this restriction for artists who, in its opinion, have made an exceptional contribution to the arts in Canada. In addition, applicants must have finished basic training or have the necessary competence to be considered a professional artist. In addition to the above programs, creative writers are also eligible for Long Term Grants for Writers. These grants offer the possibility of three-year support to writers who would be eligible for Arts Grants 'A'. The conditions are similar, except that recipients must be Canadian citizens. One grant is offered each year to an English-language writer and one to a French-language writer. The dealine for this program is October 15.
- Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council Grants: The Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) now administers the research grant program which was formerly the responsibility of the Humanities and Social Sciences Division of the Canada Council. Applications for research funds are accepted in the following major fields: administrative studies, anthropology, archaeology, architecture and design, art, classics, communication studies, criminology, demography, economics, education, folklore studies, geography, history, information sciences, industrial relations, law, library science, linguistics, literature, music, philosophy, political science, psychology, religious studies, social work, sociology, theatre, urban and regional studies. Research Grant applications may be submitted by scholars on the faculty of Canadian universities or by private scholars. Applicants must be either Canadian citizens or landed immigrants who have established residence in Canada. Applications for amounts between \$2,500 and \$10,000 may be submitted at any time. The Council normally requires four months to process a request. Applications for amounts greater than \$10,000 are submitted to the Council at only three meetings per year. The deadlines for consideration at these meetings are October 15, January 15 and July 15. Applications for amounts less than \$2,500 should be submitted to the Canada Council Travel and Small Grants Subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Research. Further information on this Subcommittee may be obtained from the Office of Research Administration. The next deadline for this program is October 30.
- <u>Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation</u>: The <u>Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation offers a</u> program of grants and fellowships to encourage research into this tragic disease. Applications to these programs must reach the Foundation no later than October 15.
- Ontario Cancer Treatment and Research Foundation: The Ontario Cancer Treatment and Research Foundation provides grants-in-aid for research on the causes and cure of cancer. The deadline for this program is October 16.

For the information of the York community, the following are the principle features of the University's settlement with Y.U.S.A.:

COMMONWEALTH SCHOLARSHIP AND FELLOWSHIP PLAN: As part of the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan, Canada offers two types of Fellowship: Canadian Visiting Fellowships and Canadian Research Fellowships.

Commonwealth Visiting Fellowships are intended to bring to Canada from other countries of the Commonwealth, persons who are prominent in various fields of education including universities, colleges, and other institutes. A Visiting Fellow will have the opportunity to discuss educational matters with Canadian colleagues, to advise and be advised on techniques and problems associated with the particular educational interest. It is intended that the visit to Canada will be of benefit to the Fellow and to his country as well as to the Canadian hosts.

The duration of the visits will normally be from two to four months, although consideration will be given to programs up to a maximum of six months. The program will be flexible but the Fellow will remain attached to one particular institution or agency during the tenure of the Fellowship.

Up to five Fellowships will be offered in 1979-80.

Commonwealth Research Fellowships are intended to bring to Canada from universities and research centres of other countries of the Commonwealth, scholars of established reputation whose presence in Canadian universities is expected to be of benefit to themselves and to their countries, as well as to their Canadian hosts. A Fellow will be free to do his own study and research and to engage in other activities for the purpose of building up contacts with Canadian colleagues during the stay in Canada.

The Research Fellow will normally be attached to a single university for the period of the Fellowship (normally one academic year), although the program might include short visits to other institutions.

Up to three Research Fellowships will be available in the 1980-81 academic year.

Nominations for these awards are to be made by the Canadian host university on behalf of the candidate. Nominations should be received by the Scholarship and Fellowship Committee no later than October 31.
