 - 1) curb parking will not be permitted in the peripheral (unreserved) lots;
 - 2) between midnight and 8:00 a.m., no parking will be permitted on any campus roads including those where parking is normally allowed (viz. Ottawa Road and the road adjacent to the Temporary Office Building); and,
 - 3) between midnight and 8:00 a.m., no parking will be permitted in any reserved area (excluding HH lot).
 The University reserves the right to suspend parking temporarily in any area for emergencies (see York Campus Parking and Traffic Regulations, 1978-79).
 When a snow emergency condition is declared in Metro Toronto, this is broadcast on local radio stations; if it is found necessary to declare an emergency at the University at any other time, this will be carried by Radio York. "Snow Emergency" signs will also be displayed at entrances to the parking lots. The degree of cooperation shown by members of the community will determine the effectiveness of snow removal; problems are presented due to the substantial number of vehicles belonging to residents which are parked overnight on campus. The above measures will enable a more efficient use to be made of snow clearing equipment, particularly during the night hours, which should prove beneficial to all.
