GENERAL

Agreements reached on the weekend of January 18-20 between the University administration and negotiators for both G.A.A. and Y.U.F.A. have been ratified by the memberships of those unions.

The two-year agreement with Y.U.F.A. calls for salary increments of 7.2% plus \$795 for the year May 1, 1979 to April 30, 1980, followed by 5.2% plus \$835 for the second year. There will also be a merit pool of 1% in the 1980-81 year. The first payments under the new Agreement are in process of being sent out to members of the bargaining unit. As soon as the Agreement can be revised to incorporate other changes agreed to in the recent negotiations, copies will be sent to all members of the bargaining unit.

The agreement with G.A.A. is for one year only -- from September 1, 1979 to August 31, 1980. The principal features of the agreement are salary increments (averaging about 9.5%) and a scheme for establishing priorities in the allocation of teaching assistantships.

The performance will be repeated on February 29 and March 1 (8:00 p.m. each evening).
