Projects may begin as early as April 1, 1980. Last year, 140 projects were approved and \$110,000 was lent to qualifying students in amounts ranging from \$200 to \$1,000. Sponsored by the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Colleges and Universities in co-operation with various Chambers of Commerce in Ontario and the Royal Bank of Canada, Student Venture Capital is part of the Ontario Youth Secretariat's Experience '80 program to provide students with employment experience. Participating Chambers of Commerce share their business expertise and familiarity of the local business climate with the students. Once the student's proposal is accepted, he or she must agree to follow standard business procedures, make regular financial reports and repay the loan by October 31, 1980. The Royal Bank of Canada provides interest-free bridge loans to students who are eager to begin their enterprises before government financing is available. A Royal Bank financial liaison officer provides banking and financial advice throughout the summer.
