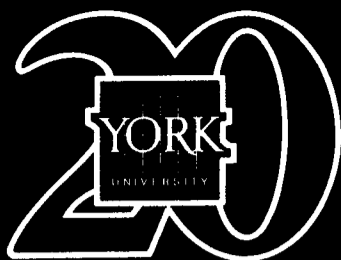

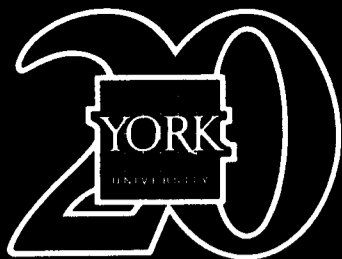

Since introducing the multi-caterer concept, the University has employed a two-tiered committee structure. The two levels of committee and respective terms of reference are:

1. USERS COMMITTEES:

These committees are named to identify each separate food service area. They are:

- Complex 1 Food Service Committee
- Complex 2 Food Service Committee
- Glendon Food Service Committee
- Osgoode Food Service Committee

Membership on Users Committees is open to any member of the York Community, and, where possible, a student will be elected chairman.

Users Committees are official sub-committees of the UFBSC proper, and will deal directly with the caterers on such local matters as:

- a) monitoring retail prices
- b) hours of operation
- c) service
  - (i) menus
  - (ii) preparation and quality of food
  - (iii) cleanliness
  - (iv) courtesy of staff, etc.

If problems are encountered, the Manager, Food and Beverage Services, will attend Users Committee meetings to assist in their resolution.

2. UNIVERSITY FOOD AND BEVERAGE SERVICES COMMITTEE (UFBSC)

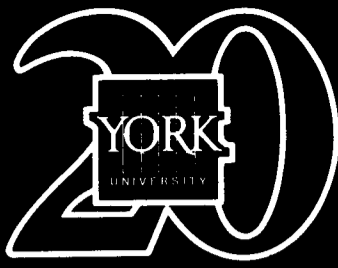
Comprises user committee chairmen (6), augmented by one representative each, from CYSF, YUFA, YUSA, and Council of Masters, plus the Manager, Food and Beverage Services who is secretary to the Committee. The UFBSC deals with specific matters relating to:

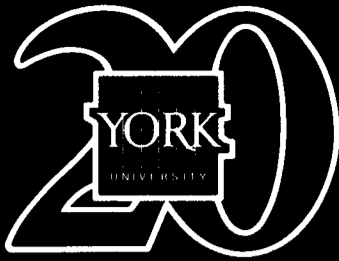



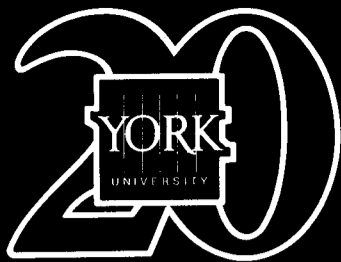

Work has started and there will be necessary disruption to normal traffic for the next several weeks. Therefore, all persons who usually use these intersections are urged to use one of the many alternate routes to and from the campus.
