## GENERAL

### University Progress Report on YUFA Negotiations

The administration's current offer to YUFA totals 13.25% in salary increments, and is for a one-year contract, May 1, 1981 to April 30, 1982. YUFA's demand is for 18.1%. A few non-monetary matters also remain at issue.

The administration's offer concentrates on salaries, in order to address the lag in York salaries vis-a-vis the Ontario system, which exists primarily at the Associate Professor rank. The offer includes:

(a) Across-the-board general adjustments of	7.75%
(b) Career Progress Increments averaging	2.8
(c) Merit pool of	1.0
(d) "Special increments" pool of	1.7
<b>TOTAL</b>	<b>13.25%</b>

The "Special Increments pool" is weighted to the advantage of YUFA-unit employees with salaries less than \$35,000 p.a. in 1980-81. Resulting percentage increments for individuals receiving the average 1% merit would be, for example:

14.9% for an employee paid @ \$25,000 in 1980-81
13.9% for an employee paid @ \$30,000 in 1980-81
13.5% for an employee paid @ \$32,507 (The average YUFA-unit salary) in 1980-81

This offer is more than reasonable, given the realities of funding for the Ontario universities in general and at York University in particular. Nonetheless, the administration remains prepared to continue negotiations if there seems to be real prospect of a responsible result.

## REPORT TO THE YORK UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY ON NEGOTIATIONS WITH Y.U.F.A.

Mediation of the contract negotiations between the University and YUFA was adjourned by the provincial mediator on Saturday, May 9, 1981, with meetings to reconvene on Tuesday, May 12, 1981.

The current offer to YUFA for increased salaries and benefits is as follows:

The special Increments proposal is weighted towards YUFA-unit employees earning less than \$35,000 in 1980-81. Assuming an equal distribution of merit funds, the University's offer would produce the following increases:

Under this proposal, the minimum increment would be \$3,358 and the maximum \$6,111.

Percentage increments would range from 9.8% to 21.3% and 72% of the YUFA bargaining unit would receive salary increases of 14% or more.

YUFA's demand is for 17.1%, without a merit component, distributed mostly across-the-board. YUFA's catch-up component is not weighted towards the lower salary categories, in contrast with the University's offer.

Certain non-monetary issues have also emerged as an impediment to a settlement. YUFA's negotiators have been insisting on changes to the Collective Agreement which the University can simply not agree to if we are to retain the marginal flexibility needed to pay for the salary offer in 1981-82 and beyond. YUFA's negotiators have demanded:

- major constraints on the University's ability to appoint faculty in the Contractually Limited category;
- an end to long-standing practices of employing a few part-time professional librarians;
- suspension of the impending retirements of YUFA-unit employees scheduled for normal retirement on June 30, 1981;
- job security equivalent to tenure for four "administrative faculty".

These matters have been largely passed over in YUFA's communications to its membership and to the University community and public. The University cannot responsibly accede to salary demands which would lead certainly to major cutbacks in programs and personnel cuts in other employee groups. Neither can it accept YUFA non-monetary proposals which would sharply constrain its ability to meet the cost of the offer already made.

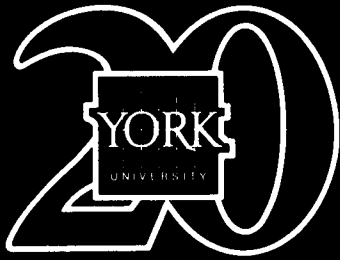

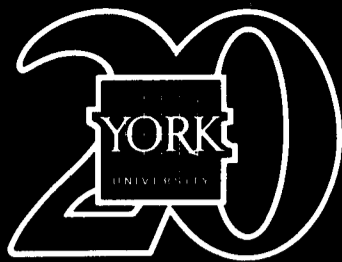
