

- * A recent Revenue Canada ruling has declared tuition fees paid by an employer to be a taxable benefit retroactive to January 1981. The relevant quotation follows: Where an educational institution provides for tuition to an employee or to his spouse or children, the fair market value of the benefit will be included in the employee's income. However, where the benefit is in respect of the employee's own tuition he is entitled to a deduction for tuition. The employee is not entitled to any such deduction in respect of tuition provided to a dependant but the latter may be entitled to the deduction."

As such, tuition fees for 1981 will be reflected as a taxable benefit on T4 slips. The value will be calculated as follows using the example of undergraduate daytime per course fees of \$183.00 for Fall/Winter '80 and \$207.00 for Fall/Winter '81:

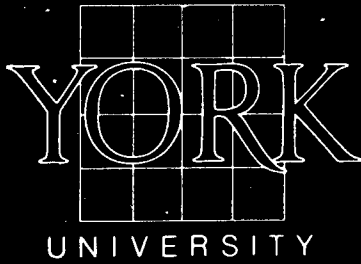

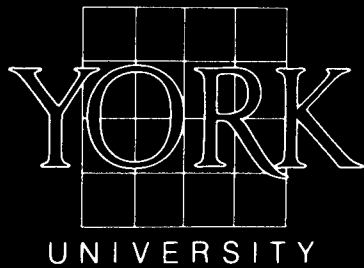
