NOTICE TO CUEW BARGAINING UNIT MEMBERS: As stated in the York Bulletin of October 22, 1981, members of the CUEW bargaining unit who did not perform their normal duties during the CUEW strike October 26-November 2, 1981, will not be paid for that period. It is the University's intention, however, to makeup the academic work lost during the strike wherever practicable to do so, and to compensate individuals for whom such makeup work is scheduled by the University. 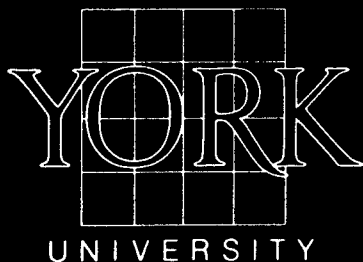

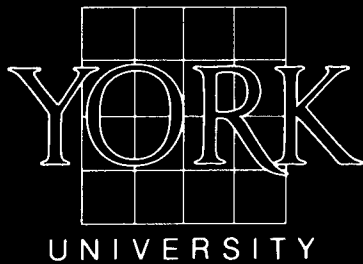
