- \* The Department of Personnel Services wishes to provide advance notice that University Offices will be closed for the period of December 24, 1981 to January 3, 1982, inclusive. Offices will reopen for business on January 4, 1982. For dates of the commencement of classes following the Christmas Break, please consult the appropriate Faculty Calendar.
- \* York University employees are reminded that copies of the 1982 "TD1 Personal Income Tax Exemption" forms have been submitted to their respective departments for completion. However, TD1 forms need not be completed by employees who filed a 1981 TD1 form unless there has been a change in circumstances affecting the Net Claim for Exemptions. If this is the case, a revised form must be completed and returned to the Payroll Department (Room B38, Temporary Office Building) no later than Friday, January 8, 1982, to effect processing.
- \* The York Bookstores request that faculty about to place textbook orders for Winter/Summer (Drop-In) courses do so as soon as possible and no later than December 4, 1981.
- \* The regular monthly meeting of the Council of the Faculty of Graduate Studies, scheduled for Thursday, December 3, will not be held.

- \* Cancellation of Classes/Closing of Offices Due to Bad Weather Conditions  
It's the time of year again when winter winds, precipitation and temperatures combine on occasion to make driving dangerous. As a large community with academic schedules to meet and many members to service, the importance of avoiding disruption is evident. There are times, however, when public safety indicates temporary interruption of the regular routines of the University. Hopefully, such occasions will be rare. The information given below is provided for the guidance of York members. The decision to cancel all classes or close the offices in the University is the responsibility of the Chairman of Senate and the President, respectively.  
When the decision is made during regular office hours, the Office of the Vice-President (University Services) will notify the designated representatives of each Faculty/College and administrative department that offices will be closed and/or classes cancelled from a specific time. The person so informed will then be responsible for passing on the message to members of the unit. An announcement will be made as soon as possible after the decision has been made and, in any case, not later than 4:00 p.m., over the following radio stations:  
Radio York, Radio Glendon, CKEY(AM), CHUM(FM), CFRB(AM), CBL(AM), CKFM(FM)  
When the decision is made before the University opens in the morning, the Emergency Services Centre will be notified and an announcement suspending classes and office attendance will be made on the above designated stations as soon after 7:00 a.m. as possible.  
Unless such announcements are made, members of the community will be expected to maintain regular schedules and are asked not to telephone the Office of the Vice-President (University Services).

In view of the University closing early in the month of December, it is critical that any banking or address changes be submitted prior to Monday, December 7, 1981, to the Payroll Office to ensure timely processing.
- \* SNOW EMERGENCY: Members of the community at the York campus are advised that when a Snow Emergency is declared by Metropolitan Toronto or at the University, the following restrictions on parking will be imposed in order to facilitate snow removal:
  - (1) curb parking will not be permitted in the peripheral (unreserved) lots;
  - (2) between midnight and 8:00 a.m. no parking will be permitted on any campus roads including those where parking is normally allowed (viz. Ottawa Road and the road adjacent to the Temporary Office Building)\*; and,
  - (3) between midnight and 8:00 a.m. no parking will be permitted in any reserved area (excluding HH lot)\*.

[Note: \*the University reserves the right to suspend parking temporarily in any area for emergencies; York Campus Parking and Traffic Regulations 1981/82.]  
Snow Emergency conditions in Metropolitan Toronto will be broadcast on local radio stations and if it is found necessary to declare an emergency at the University at any other time, announcements will be carried by Radio York; "Snow Emergency" signs will also be displayed at entrances to the parking lots. The degree of cooperation shown by members of the community will determine the effectiveness of snow removal. The above measures will enable a more efficient use to be made of snow removal equipment, particularly during the night hours, which will prove beneficial to all.
- \* Cheques Requisitioned from the Accounting Office: The Office of the Chief Accountant requests the cooperation of the community in adhering to the practice of allowing 5 days for the preparation of cheques, including travel advances, petty cash reimbursements, etc. Special pick-up is asked to not be requested unless absolutely necessary. While one of the prime functions of the Accounting Department is to serve the needs of the University community, and they are prepared to accommodate urgent requests on an exception basis, this can only be achieved at the cost of a loss in productive time and additional workload for their staff.

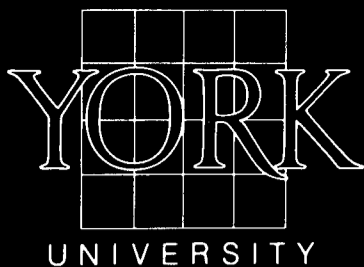

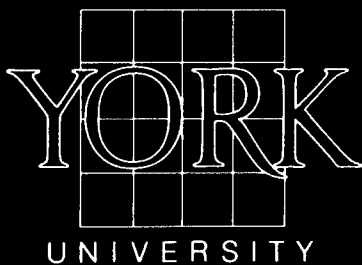

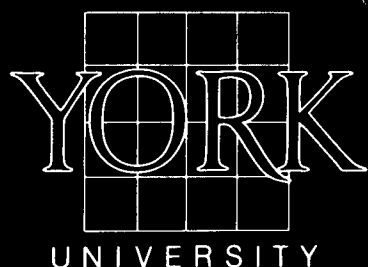
